# Rector's Thoughts June 2021

## What if?

What if the final easing of Covid restrictions does not go ahead as planned on June 21<sup>st</sup>? I am writing this on May 31<sup>st</sup>. We need to be prepared for such a possibility because no government is entirely in control of events. All my life I have watched governments take the credit when things go well and blame it on events beyond their control when things go wrong.

They are, of course, partly right in both situations and partly wrong as well. But if we are learning anything from this experience, then it is that a global pandemic is precisely that. It is global. In other words, we are all in this together. The fact that in Sub-Saharan Africa only two percent of the population have received a Covid vaccination affects the people of Worcestershire as much as the people of Zambia.

Two months ago I quoted one of the great poets of the English language and the Dean of St Paul's Cathedral, John Donne, who in a time of plague in London wrote, "Ask not for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee". That principle was true when he wrote those words 400 years ago and it is true today.

But let me go back to my original question. What if? What if the restrictions under which we have been living for over a year now are not finally lifted on June 21<sup>st</sup>? I asked this question of a couple who plan to marry soon just yesterday. I asked them if they would marry if the number of people who could attend their wedding were still to be restricted to 30. I was delighted to hear that they would go ahead with their wedding, but it is a hard choice. A restriction of just 30 people means having to decide which friends or even family will not be invited. Feelings might be hurt and friendships might end. And what if there can be no party after the ceremony? Apart from the sadness about missing out, jobs will be at risk and local businesses as well. We will all suffer from that. Ask not for whom the bell tolls.

When things don't go as we have hoped we learn what our happiness is based upon. In the New Testament the Day of Judgement is the day of *krisis*. You don't have to be a scholar of Greek to know what words in English come from that word. Crisis and criticism come quickly to mind. Every crisis makes us think critically. At least it ought to.

And when we ask the question what is our happiness based upon, ancient wisdom teaches us that the three main things are:

- Safety and Security. I believe that if I and the people that I care about are safe and secure then I will be happy and I am unhappy if my or their security is threatened in any way.
- Power and Control. I believe that if I have enough control over my life then I will be happy. I am unhappy if that control is threatened in any way.
- Affection and Esteem. I believe that if I get enough affection and respect from others then I will be happy. If I do not think that I am getting enough of either of these then I become unhappy.

Every threat, every day of judgement or crisis, teaches me which of these is most important to me. That is, it does if I allow it to. And if I allow it to, then what I learn is that my basis for happiness is very fragile. And by the way, when I say *my basis for happiness* I really do mean me. In every challenge I realise how much I still rely on these things. It's rather humbling for someone of my calling I can assure you.

And every challenge, every crisis calls me to put my trust in something deeper than safety, control, affection. Not that trust in God (or Love or a Higher Power) means that my security, control or the respect that I think I deserve will not be threatened, but that I trust that God will never leave me or forsake me.

I hope that all restrictions will be lifted on June 21<sup>st</sup> but I also know that there will be other challenges. Some will affect me alone. Some I will share with others. And I can learn from every one of them.

May and June seem to have been months of extremes from very wet in May to hot and dry in June, with of course the typical English 'summer' day where you whip through all the seasons one after the other!

The idea of 'moderation in all things' seems a little way off as we try and catch up with time lost in lockdown. We have been delighted to begin having baptism services again, two gorgeous girls to start with, and a baptism every Sunday somewhere in the Benefice until October....so far! We are also looking forward to a summer of weddings with five in August and one in September; we really wish all these couples the very best in their lives together especially after the stresses and strains of the uncertainty and postponements they have had to deal with.

Our 'Love your Burial Ground' week had lovely summer weather and a full report can be found elsewhere in the magazine. We hope this can become a regular event and we will gradually see an increase in diversity in this wonderful green space. This will be an ongoing project and can involve anyone who is interested in wildlife, in monuments or who is a regular visitor to the burial ground.

This brings us to a suitable point to mention that we are running out of space in the burial ground, and at a PCC meeting in 2018 we renewed the resolution to only accept those who are resident in the Parish, for either burial or interment of ashes, so we don't have to close the burial ground in the near future.

Work is still progressing on the windows of the church and during the summer we hope the 'outside' windows will be completed and scaffolding removed from the ends of the building. The next windows are the 'Clerestory' ones which are above the pews in the church. This will involve some substantial scaffolding in the church (one side at a time) as the sheer height of the building means the significant weight of the scaffold needs to be placed away from the wooden floors of the pews (so at the edge of the centre and side aisles). We are sure this will create an opportunity for something, Ideas on how to use the scaffolding please!!




Years 1 to 4 came to explore the churchyard as part of 'Love Your Burial Ground Week'. Magical Monuments, Art and Architecture and Precious Places provided themes for the children to focus on. Several children looked for family members memorial stones – not all managed it but were encouraged to bring mum and dad back to help them find them. A special treat at the end of the visit (after a drink and a biscuit!) was to step into the Old Chancel and begin to understand its place in the life of the Sandys family.

## From the Archive: Spring Number 1948

### A Good Samaritan

## **From the Archive: Easter Number 1951**

### **What's in a Name?**

Our surname, of course, comes from our parents, but the other by which we are distinguished from the rest of the clan, is given us by our sponsors – and, thank goodness, they never called us Cuthbert, Marmaduke or Job! As to the prefix, here again it depends – in the case of the clergy, upon whether they are Venerable, or Very Reverend or Right, to say nothing of the Rather Reverends in the shape of the Rural Deans. The Prayer Book directs us to pray for Bishops and Curates only, the correct title for the clergy – *cure* in French, i.e. the one who has the cure or charge of souls.

We ourselves are variously known as the slightly irreverend Rector or Vicar, sometimes as the Officiating Minister, and in official communications as the *Sitting Incumbent*, which makes us feel rather like a broody hen. The first title, inherited from the former Rector together with his Rectory stamp (which cost us twelve and six) was given to us by our sponsors, the sitting church wardens when we first arrived, one of whom, as the sitting Editor of the Parish Magazine for the nonce, welcomed in the preceding issue the New Rector or Rector-designate, and asked for sympathetic encouragement and a blessing on his work. As the incumbent still sitting, we have often brooded over the warm words of welcome that the interregnum number of the Magazine contained; they have encouraged us to preserve undaunted, despite the weather and the other names, some of them unprintable, by which we have been called.



## Brine Memories

### A local project to capture the unique history of the Droitwich Spa Brine Baths


#### Can you help?

Did you ever go to or work at the brine baths in Droitwich? The last one, attached to the private hospital in the town centre, was closed very suddenly at the end of 2008, ending nearly 180 years of saltwater bathing in Droitwich. The brine baths are the reason why our town is called 'Droitwich Spa'; ever since the first baths opened in 1836, people have been coming here to bathe in the incredibly salty water for both medical and recreational purposes. The brine, pumped up from between seams of rock under the town, was used to treat conditions such as rheumatism and arthritis. In the town's heyday, thousands of patients from all over the world came to Droitwich for several weeks at a time to take a course of 'brine' treatment.

All of this is well documented. What isn't so well recorded is the town's more recent brine heritage. From the 50's through to the noughties, patients still regularly used the baths for treatment and physio, but others came for leisure and enjoyment. The baths were a place to meet, take your visitors, go to the gym, have a massage, celebrate a birthday, have a night out or even a hen party. We know of people who came to float in the brine to get over their fear of water, or who 'hung out' at the baths every weekend when they were teenagers. We've heard from people who did 'work experience' at the baths or who met the person they went on to marry while bobbing in the brine. There were even those who came just to ogle at famous footballers who used the baths before matches.

### **Brine Memories – the Project**

Our aim over the next few months is to collect stories, photos and memorabilia connected to the brine baths going back as far as we can in living memory. 'We' are a group of friendly volunteers from SOBBs, 'Save Our Brine Baths', a not-for-profit organisation whose ultimate aim is to restore brine bathing to Droitwich.

Thanks to a £10,000 grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, we are creating a permanent archive for the Droitwich Heritage Centre, a website and an exhibition. We have also been working with Westacre Middle School where the entire Year 5 year group will become 'Brine Detectives'.

### ***How can you help?***

We would love to hear from anyone who has a story to tell, or who worked at the St Andrews Brine Baths or the BMI baths. Perhaps you can put us in contact with someone who has a connection to the baths, who had treatment there or who worked in related businesses, such as the many hotels in the town. We are also interested in hearing from those involved in decision-making, particularly over the closure of the St Andrew's baths in 1975 and the opening of the BMI baths in 1985. We hope to discover more about the town's spa heritage, key buildings and economy and then share this with the next generation of Droitwich residents.
