Rector's Thoughts October 2021

If the goal of a pilgrimage is to reach an intended destination then our hundred mile journey from St Oswald's church at Heavenfield on Hadrian's Wall to Holy Island ended in failure. In the Kyloe woods that overlook the island, Laura and I took a wrong turn and by the time we had discovered our mistake we were some miles out of our way. We had arranged to be picked up by taxi on the island in time to leave it before the tide cut it off from the mainland and there was now no chance that this rendezvous could be achieved. We phoned the taxi company with whom we had made this arrangement and were picked up by the side of the road at the junction of the road between Lowick and Fenwick and the road to Holburn. Our pilgrimage was at a slightly disappointing end.

We live in a very goal-oriented society in which our lives are constantly being assessed by others and by ourselves as successful or as a failure. The quite bizarre behaviour of a number of people at the supposed failure of the England football team to win the European Championship this

summer even though in reaching the final they had already achieved more than any other England side since the 1966 World Cup points to the absurdity of such an attitude. If we were to choose to judge that side by a different set of criteria we might choose to praise them for the dignity that they showed in the face of the vitriol that was poured upon them by certain people. We might recognise that the goal of building a civilised society might well be better achieved by such dignity than by lifting a sporting trophy.

My own small experience of success and failure in walking the St Oswald's Way in Northumberland causes me to think about the things that really matter. The acts of kindness and generosity that we experienced along the way; the many moments of delight that we experienced; the surprises that would sometimes seem to spring from nowhere; all these were not achievements on our part but gifts. And a life that is received as a gift is one that is to be consistently received with gratitude. The word in Christian worship that describes that kind of consistent reception is Eucharist, a Greek word that means thanksgiving. It is one of the names given to the service of Holy Communion that is the very centre of Christian worship and Christian life.

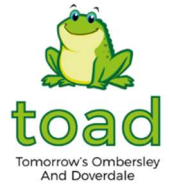

We will say more on the result, when we know it, in the November magazine, but meantime we wish to thank you all for following Toad over the last 4 years and giving us your opinions. We would also like to send our heartfelt thanks to all the volunteers who worked on the plan reports, the household questionnaire, at coffee mornings and by walking the Parish delivering leaflets. We would not be where we are without you.

Lasting Reflections: A Place to Remember

Ombersley Memorial Hall Committee and Trustees are working with the Parish Council to honour the request made by so many residents asking for a place to remember a loved one.

An opportunity has now arisen for residents to sponsor (as a whole, or in part e.g. half a bench, or simply as a donation towards) a tree, bench or a picnic bench in the Memorial Field.

The Trees

Nine trees will be available to sponsor at a cost of £165 each. Three *Betula* var. Snow Queen (Snow Queen Birch tree): a variety with white bark from a young age for all year around interest with the autumn foliage turning a rich golden yellow.

Three *Sorbus aria* var. *Lutescens*, a variety of whitebeam: a medium size tree with grey-green foliage and white flowers, which later develop into orange and red berries.

Three *Crataegus prunifolia* var. *Splendens*: a variety of hawthorn with very bright persistent red berries, which develop from white flowers in May and with copper/bronze foliage in autumn.

Benches

Six sided benches will be available for sponsorship at a cost of £875 each and two picnic benches at a cost of £620 each. At an additional cost of approximately £75, depending on words, a memory plaque can be added.

From the Archive: The Choir - Notes from the Vicar. J. Webster

February 1896: The Vicar desires to give notice that instead of the usual subscription list for choir expenses, collections will be made by the Church at morning and evening service on the third Sunday in the month. The Vicar trusts that those who appreciate reverent musical service will contribute to the maintenance of an efficient choir.

March 1896: The great change in the arrangement of our choir is now complete and has turned out a success. The effect of the surplice choir is to give much more dignity to our service and will in course of time conduce greatly to the reverence and heartiness with which these services should be conducted. The singing sounds much better from the Chancel, and men and boys are evidently taking that pride and interest in their duties which must very soon result in the attainment of a high standard of efficiency. We are pleased that the change is acceptable to the parish at large.

July 1896: The Vicar desires to point out that the custom which is common in almost every church in the country of allowing the choir and clergy to leave the Church before the congregation will soon have no exception in Ombersley Church. It is simply a carrying out of the Scriptural command '*Let all things to be done decently and in order,*' and besides this, is to a great extent a question of manners.

December 1896: We are pleased that the Rector of a neighbouring parish has been so much impressed by the success and proficiency of our choir that he is intending soon to introduce a surplice choir into his own church. Ombersley people have indeed good reason to be proud of their choir, for we know that "imitation is the sincerest flattery".

Choir excursion; September 1899: The members of the choir to the number of 22, accompanied by the Vicar made Blackpool the scene of their summer outing on August 4th. The journey from Droitwich was very enjoyable as the train passed through the pretty country of Derbyshire and the scenery was highly appreciated. Blackpool was reached soon after 10 o'clock and there a great variety of entertainments and sights offered endless amusement and occupation. Dinner and tea, both excellently served, were partaken at the Tower Restaurant and the return journey was commenced at 7.30, Ombersley being reached about 2.30 a.m.

Extracts from the Parish Council records: The War Memorial

At the annual Parish meeting on 1st April 1947 "The Rev. G.W.Gillingham, Vicar of Ombersley, said that he felt strongly that some memorial should be erected to those from the Parish who lost their lives whilst serving their country in the recent war. They were nine in number and he suggested a cross in a bay in the churchyard with suitable inscription, and he hoped the Parish would feel that it was its duty to undertake it."

Following a public meeting on May 20th a committee was formed and subscriptions successfully raised. The architect was Ben Davis of Worcester. A dedication service was held on 15th February 1949 in the presence of Lord Sandys.

The memorial bears the 43 names of those who fell during WWI, and the 10 names of those who died in WWII. The observant amongst you will notice that this is one more than the Rev. Gillingham mentioned in WWII and that on the Memorial itself one name is out of alphabetical order at the end of the list. This is explained in the 14th April minutes where a councillor



reports receiving a letter from a gentleman at Lineholt whose son's name was missing from the Memorial although he had died whilst serving in France. The Parish Council promised to look into the matter urgently and his name was duly added.

The minutes of 18th January 1950 record that the War Memorial Committee had £71 18s 11d in surplus funds and wished this to be devoted to the upkeep of the Memorial with a permanent body to undertake this responsibility. A letter was read to the Parish Council on 19th July 1950 saying the Church Council had agreed to this undertaking.

Houses are dotted about, amongst old stone walls, fields with sheep, cows and Shetland ponies. There are few trees in sheltered spots, a bit like the Yorkshire Moors, but we don't miss them because of the breath-taking views of the sea.

The village shop with butchery, newspapers, and post office is only $\frac{1}{4}$ mile away and it caters for all our needs. The lane which passes our house leads to Croft House Museum. The capital, Lerwick, is 25 minutes away. It's similar in size to Bewdley and has a large museum depicting Shetland life and history, a theatre and several pubs with jamming sessions of folk music on Wednesday evening

- fiddles, accordians and a guitarist. A great place for a pint, but it is ZERO tolerance here, so no drinking and driving.

Madge and family live 40 minutes away. Peter is happy with his huge shed and I've taken over a corner for my bits and pieces and office plus a corner for the upright piano. It seems as if we are on a permanent holiday – please visit us. We would be delighted to see you.

Do you watch the Shetland Murder Programmes? Jimmy Perez and the TV crew were here again in June filming in Lerwick and the surrounding countryside for the next series. They bring their own caravan accommodation and catering wagon, but this may be due to Covid. We have to observe the same Covid rules as mainland Scotland, but cases are low.

There is a shortage of cement here, due to extensive work in the Weisdale Valley, preparing the valley for a wind farm with over 100 turbines. Many islanders are against it and Nicola Sturgeon and the developers are disliked.

We shall be back again in late October/November to finalise the Poppy Appeal for Ombersley & Doverdale and to attend the Remembrance Services.

A Parish Coronavirus Chronicle: Part 2

Some Thoughts on The Coronavirus Pandemic

The past year and a half have been a remarkable experience for all of us and one that we will never forget. I do not know if it is over yet but there is little doubt that the remarkable achievement of the vaccination programme has made a significant difference to all of our lives.

I wonder what difference the pandemic has made. For some people the only question that matters is what effect it has had upon them and the people who matter to them. It's the place where all of us start. I remember once hearing an interview with a woman who had been flooded out of her home at the end of the winter of 1947. "It's worse than anything that happened in the war," she said. Worse than the bombing of our cities? Worse than the holocaust? No, just the worst thing that had happened to her. So, I look back and remember a little girl, a pretty bridesmaid at a wedding, whose father, a doctor at the Queen Elizabeth hospital in Birmingham died of the virus at that early stage when medical staff were not properly protected and yet kept going back to the front line at the risk of their lives. I will never forget her face or their courage.

I hope that the kindness that so many have shown to their neighbours will continue. I hope that the resilience that we have learned will continue. And I hope that we will never forget the sacrifices that others have made for us and that we will all live more grateful lives and find ways of saying thank you to others as often as we can.

St Andrew's Church: March 2020.

Under Government and C of E advice, all public worship in the UK ceased. Churches were to lock their doors to services, including funerals and even for access to individual contemplation and prayer.

Like most businesses and organisations, we turned to "Zoom" as a means around the restrictions. Weekly services under the guidance of Rev Stephen Winter became the norm across all seven parishes with "attendances" of over 100 participants and facilitating a closer relationship between all within the Severn Parish Benefice.

Zoom, initially, presented quite a challenge but we soon 'learned how' and it was gratifying to hear how much people valued the opportunity to see and hear others when they were otherwise 'marooned' in their homes. Easing of lockdown, permitting limited church services, encouraged us to go digital to stream and record services from St Andrew's - a boon during restricted numbers for funerals, and enabling wedding families to be brought together virtually via Zoom screens in church. We even had a Godparent from Australia for one baptism!

The churchyard was always open allowing a peaceful place for those who needed it and the Lychgate became a hub for book (and plant) exchange. As restrictions eased we turned to our beautiful outdoors to facilitate 'safe' gatherings where, at last, singing together could be allowed and greatly enjoyed.

We tried to be there for as many people as possible and appreciated the amazing community connections and support for those in need that were generated by these times of hardship.

The pandemic turned my life upside down.

I was at university as pubs were advised to close and quickly returned home to Ombersley as I didn't want to be stuck in my student house. This meant I paid three months' rent without stepping foot in it. People ask me what I did in lockdown. Exams were cancelled but I still had a combined 8000 words of coursework to write. I did this without access to books and alone at home. It was tough to motivate myself. My summer job working at an international summer camp was cancelled along with lots of internships for young people. I was lucky that I didn't need the funds but others did struggle.

My year abroad, compulsory as part of my degree, was the background to my summer. At the end of August, I was meant to be travelling to Vancouver to study. It is a complicated story that includes tears but eventually a place at the University of Connecticut online was found. The next issue was housing. I'd had enough of living at home and ended up in private halls sharing with people I had never met. Luckily, we got on okay.

Online university was palatable in the beginning. I survived the first semester and enjoyed my break over Christmas. The second semester was a different matter. I was still hoping to go out to Canada but couldn't, so continued online at Connecticut. It was now lockdown three so I only went into Uni once and slept, studied and relaxed in my room.

In the first semester I went into Uni a couple of times a week. It was open with reduced capacity and mask wearing was compulsory but it was a change of scene. Studying in the library was an unpleasant experience with 'DON'T SIT HERE' stickers everywhere and security guards checking you had a mask on. All university cafes were shut, even for takeaway, so you couldn't get a pick-me-up to keep going. My modules in the second semester were much more intense. I didn't feel part of a community, had been working really hard, but was bored because some questions I could have answered age 15. It was a relief for it all to be over.

Things are now looking up. Hopefully University will get back to some normality next year. I just hope that society realises the sacrifices the young have made. Years abroad are still being cancelled, the job market is very competitive and many experiences including Proms and Graduations have been cancelled.
