Rector's Thoughts

Reverend Stephen Winter Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



"So here it is, Merry Christmas!" and even as I write these words, that I am sure are familiar to you all, I do so in the knowledge that Noddy Holder, the man who made them famous, is currently being treated for cancer. As a near neighbour to us as a Black Country man, we think of him and his family in our prayers.

In these troubled times there are words that are read in our churches each year at Christmas, up and down the land, that mean an awful lot to me.

"The light shines in the darkness and the darkness can never put it out."

If you have ever lit a single candle in a darkened room you will notice that it changes the atmosphere of the room in a way that switching on a light cannot do. Recently we lit candles for those who have died in the last two years in church services in Ombersley and Elmley Lovett. I know, as I spoke with people who attended those services, that lighting the candles had a powerful effect on them and a number of them told me that they light candles when they visit churches. So do I. I light them for the people that I especially love and for the troubles of the world. I have already spoken about one moment in the Christmas services that especially moves me. That moment comes in the Christmas Service of Holy Communion and we read those words on Christmas night. Another comes in a Christingle Service when everyone who attends is given an orange to symbolise the world with a candle that is placed in it. I have been involved in Christingle services in many different places, including cathedrals and small churches, for many years now, and when the moment comes when the candles are lit and the lights are turned down something magical happens. I feel it myself and I see it in the faces of children and their families who have come to the service.

And that leads me to my last point. One of the sadnesses of growing older is that so many of us lose our childhood sense of wonder and delight. Then Christmas comes along once again and for a moment we remember. I recall hearing the distinguished psychiatrist, Professor Anthony Clare, say that if he wanted a quick way to find out a person's current state of mind he asked them about their memories of Christmas.

But what we tend to do is to ask our children and grandchildren to carry that sense of wonder and delight on our behalf. We say things like, "Christmas is for children" and we are partly right. I even find myself saying things like that, or at least I feel them. But I wonder if one of the big problems in the world right now is that we do not think that wonder and delight have anything to do with the adult world. They are just for children.

So, I want to challenge you to try this spiritual practice this year, at the very darkest time of year. When you go to a Nativity Play or Carol Service, Christingle, Family Service or Holy Communion and a moment comes when you recall a childhood memory, or are touched by your children or grandchildren, or by the singing of a favourite carol, or a magical moment of any kind, don't just let it go by but stop a while. Lean into your feelings, whatever they are. Take notice of them so that you can come back to them later.

And make sure that you do come back to them from time to time. Let those feelings start to do their work in your hearts. And then, I promise you, the light that shines in the darkness, that the darkness that can never put out, will start to burn more brightly in your heart too.

A very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you all.

Fly Tipping

Solar Update for Ombersley and Doverdale. (Food or Fuel)

Following on from the article published in the July/August magazine, Wychavon Council has now received a full planning application from Tyler Hill Renewables for two plots of Grade A agricultural land in Comhampton. In addition, an application has been submitted for land at Norchard and a Battery Storage Power Plant at Lincomb. A planning application has already been approved for a solar site in Doverdale. Time for objection to the above sites has now passed, but the above applications can be viewed on the Wychavon District Council Web Site by selecting planning, quick search a planning application and then entering the appropriate reference number.

Playground Refurbishment

Following several requests from parents, the Parish Council have arranged to refurbish certain parts of the play area to include drainage, matting and repairs to some equipment. The work will take place in November and will last for approximately two weeks weather permitting. For Health and Safety reasons the play area will be closed during this period.

Playground: Historical Note from the Memorial Hall Minutes

In October 1959 the Parish Council asked if the Hall Committee would consider installing playing equipment for local children, the equipment to consist of a 4-piece swing, merry-go-round, see-saw and two seats - all on concrete base. The response was: 'Whilst the Hall Committee was prepared to grant facilities, money to finance the venture would be needed. The Hall Committee would organize an event to raise money.' The following September, the Parish Council took over a piece of land 50 x100 feet alongside the bowling green to build a children's playground at a rent of 1 shilling per annum.

The weeks when guns were carried by many Parishioners

It was not to repel the occupants of Holt Castle claiming the Court's land, nor was it the result of a family feud being settled in the Kings Arms car park. It could have been a report of German paratroopers landing in Doverdale as the Ombersley Home Guard rushed to round them up. The actual cause of this call to arms, and the shotgun army was the humble wood pigeon!

In the early 1960s Ombersley was still major vegetable growing area, and one of the specialities was the growing of Brussel sprouts. There were acres of them around the village, and an Ombersley sprout rivalled those produced elsewhere! The winter of 1963 was one of the hardest recorded with deep snow and hard frosts. This meant that the wood pigeons could not find their usual food sources, and as the tops of the sprout plants were the main thing showing above the frozen landscape, they became their food supply.

While it was only the local birds, it was not a major problem, but as the cold spell continued, more and more birds arrived from surrounding areas until there were huge flocks of several hundred birds descending on the crops. Growers were beginning to become concerned about loosing their crops, and so the call to arms was issued. You did not need a shotgun licence at that time, and cartridges were easily available at Brandons Hardware shop in Ombersley, so growers were grateful for anyone who could shoot to come and protect their crop.

The local postman would carry a gun in his van. My neighbour took my gun during the day as I was still at school, and as he was a builder, he would shoot out of his van window as he went to thaw out frozen pipes. Still the size of the flock grew, the birds would fly from one end of the field after being shot at only to be shot at again when they came down at the other end of the field. There were reports of one shot taking out multiple pigeons as the birds continued to come. My brother and I could only shoot at weekends and we brought our kill home to eat. However, eventually we were overwhelmed and even the cat refused to eat them!

If you find the occasional bangs from the clay pigeon shoot slightly annoying, imagine what it was like when guns were going off all around the village every day for around two months!

The beautiful reds and oranges of the trees and other foliage this year during Autumn are amazing as we start heading into the cold days and darker nights of winter.

As November slowly crawls into December tidying the garden is important in preparation for the year ahead. Clearing debris and decaying leaves to be added to the compost, cutting back perennials and planting and potting up bulbs for the Spring and it's also the time to be planting and transplanting trees and shrubs. Cover less hardy plants and shrubs ready for the frosts and colder weather and prune acers, vines and fruit trees taking any hardwood cuttings. Harvest your winter vegetables and enjoy the fruits of your labour and remember to care for the wildlife in your garden.

Going into December, the gardening club looks forward to the **9th December** when we are holding a wreath making workshop, followed on the **14th December** with the club's Christmas dinner.

Nearing the end of 2023 and heading into 2024 the club looks to a great year with some excellent events and speakers starting on the **18th January** with Julie Ritche whose talk is Winter into Spring.

As 2023 draws to a close, Ombersley gardening club would like to wish everyone a very happy, merry and peaceful Christmas and New Year and we look forward to welcoming members old and new to the club in 2024.

What do Bude's forgotten genius and motorcars have in common?

Firstly, who is Bude's forgotten genius? Sir Goldsworthy Gurney (1793 to 1875), a son of Cornwall, was a Medical Surgeon, Chemist, Architect, Musician, Builder, Lecturer and Inventor: a prototypical gentleman scientist of the early Victorian era. However, unlike Stephenson, Brunel and Trevithick, he is comparatively unknown. Trained initially in Cornwall as a surgeon, he moved to London where he continued with his medical practice, but lent his fertile mind to the scientific developments of his age.

As a musician, he built his own piano. However, his earliest most famous development was the oxyhydrogen blowpipe. By adding oxygen and then hydrogen into the centre of the flame from an ordinary oil lamp, he was able to intensify the light produced significantly. He then spread the light by a clever design of mirrors. So efficient was this, that the Houses of Parliament in 1839 used three of his "Bude Lights" to light the House of Commons – replacing 260 candles. It wasn't until 60 years later that they were changed for electrical lighting. His oxyhydrogen pipe in conjunction with burning lime was used to give a brilliant light to light the stage in theatres – hence the expression "Being in the Limelight".

His list of other inventions is too great to mention in detail, but briefly they were as follows. He built his home in Bude on sand dunes, using a "concrete raft" instead of foundations; his invention is now used regularly in building work today. He invented the "Steam Jet" whereby injecting waste steam from a steam engine into the exhaust from the boiler greatly increased the air flow over the fire and hence the power of the engine. This was used in 1829 to power the first successful railway engine – Stephenson's "Rocket".

His "Steam Jet" was used to ventilate mines, increasing production as well as cleaning sewers. The smell from the drains around the Houses of Parliament was so great that work became impossible there – "The Great Stink" of 1858. Gurney's steam jet was used to ventilate the drains, discharging its steam up through Big Ben, using it as an exhaust chimney! Part of his investigation of the smell required setting off great amounts of gunpowder to observe the smoke direction in order to identify the air flow. At the time, he was described as a greater danger to Parliament than Guy Fawkes!

Another great innovation was the "Gurney Stove", patented in 1856. Before that time, heating was by open fires. He set his fire in a bowl of water, using the steam generated to heat fins on the side of the stove, increasing the radiant heat dramatically. By 1897, over 10,000 churches, schools and public institutions used his stove. The base hut

built for Captain Scott in the Antarctic for his 1910 – 1913 expedition was heated by a Gurney Stove.



So, what is his connection with the motor car?

Most people would suggest that the motorcar is a 20th century invention. However, Gurney in 1825 patented "an apparatus for propelling carriages on common roads without the aid of horses, with sufficient speed for the carriage of passengers and goods". Over the next few years, he developed a roadgoing, steam powered vehicle – a motorised carriage or motorcar.

Initially the boiler was part of the car, however he soon realised that the public weren't impressed with sitting on top of a steam boiler, so he separated the boiler from the carriage. This was patented as the "Gurney Steam Drag". The first commercial service ran from Cheltenham to Gloucester in 1831. Drags were sold to a number of other companies, including in Glasgow. Unfortunately, the drag in Glasgow was mishandled by the owners and exploded, resulting in "Questions in Parliament" and public outrage.

In 1832 he was forced to close his workshop. The Government, conceding to landowners with vested interests in selling land for railways, granted money for the development of the railways and imposed a hefty tax on road going steam powered vehicles. This was the death knell for road driven motor vehicles for another 64 years. It wasn't until 1896 that the "Red Flag Act" was repealed. This Act of Parliament required vehicles to travel at a maximum of 4mph in the country and 2mph in towns along with a man walking in front with a red flag. The repeal of this Act is commemorated each year when about 400 pre-1905 cars drive from London to Brighton. If you want to know what that is like, may I suggest you watch the film "Genevieve", made in 1953. This is a delightful comedy highlighting the eccentric characters who drive on this run – some of whom live locally!

Lloyds Educational Foundation – 300 Year Celebrations

The 17th October 2023, marks the 300 Year Anniversary of the establishment of the Lloyds Educational Foundation. The Foundation, founded in 1723, was responsible for creating Ombersley First School and Sytchampton Endowed Primary School in order to provide a free education for children of poorer families in the local area.

In order to mark the 300 Year Anniversary, both schools spent a day immersing themselves in the history of their schools and the Lloyds Foundation. The children at Sytchampton Endowed Primary School dressed up in Victorian clothes and studied some of the artefacts kept by the school, including Log Books and Admissions Records. They also learnt how life in school was different when the schools were first established. At Ombersley First School, the children also learned about the history of the Lloyds Foundation and what life was like 300 years ago. They also created a whole school photograph in the shape of the number, 300!



Pupils in Years 3 and 4 recreated an old photograph in the style of those taken in the 1800s. The teacher even had the original cane!

Some of the current Trustees of the Lloyds Educational Foundation joined both schools on the day for a celebratory assembly and awarded the schools a commemorative plaque. Pupils in both schools also received a commemorative pin badge. The Trustees were delighted to see how enthusiastic the pupils were at both schools in their research of life in the 1700s, and wished both Ombersley and Sytchampton well for the next 300 years!


The First Car Journey

was made in 1888, by a lady.....

There has long been some dispute as to who invented the motor car. Both Otto Daimler and Carl Benz designed and built motor vehicles driven by an internal combustion engine in about 1886. However, it is indisputable that the first real car journey was undertaken by Bertha Benz at 5am on Sunday 5th August 1888.

To set the scene, the Vatican had declared that an automobile was a devil's or witch's contraption and people were advised that they shouldn't even look at such a vehicle. The Grand Duchy of Baden, where the Benz family lived, had banned vehicles from public roads and indeed had stationed policemen outside the Benz home to prevent him from taking his automobile onto public roads.

At 5am on that Sunday in August, Bertha and her two sons, Richard 13 years old and Eugen aged 15, set off from Mannheim, leaving undetected via a back gate. All this without the knowledge of her cautious husband, who was merely left a note on the breakfast table alerting him of their plan, which was to drive the 66 miles to Pforzheim to see relatives, using the Benz Mark III Patent-Motorwagen (see photograph below). This car was capable of 2hp and a speedy 10mph – on the flat. However, it was remarkably economical, running at 25mpg. The only problem was the fuel tank's capacity of 1.3 gallons. Bertha, ever prepared, had arranged for Herr Ockel, a chemist at the Stadt Apotheke to sell her some Ligroin – cleaning fluid which early cars used as a petrol. The Stad Apotheke is now recognised as the World's first filling station.



The many hills soon showed that the simple wood block brakes were ineffective. Ever ingenious, Bertha bought some leather from a shoemaker to line the wood inventing the first brake pad. She used her hat pin to unblock the fuel line, and her garter to insulate the fraved sparking plug wire. The radiator had to be constantly refilled from streams and rivers on the way.

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As a result of this journey, Karl Benz was eventually allowed to drive at 3.5mph in Mannheim and 7.5mph outside the city limits.

The 66-mile journey took over 12 hours to complete. On hearing of her arrival, her husband, fearing legal and religious repercussions, begged her to return – which she did by driving the return journey!

Her sheer determination and perseverance have won her recognition as the first real driver of an automobile and showed the true possibility of the automobile and its real function – to visit relatives.
