Rector's Thoughts

Reverend Stephen Winter Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



Not so long ago I learnt from someone I know in the world of pensions that the Church of England Pension Fund is a cause of some amusement in that community. This is not because of any perceived lack of competence on the part of those who administer that fund, but because of the particular set of problems faced by those administrators. You see, the problem that they face is that the clergy of the Church of England simply live too long. A combination of moderate personal habits and a decent diet and plenty of exercise (we clergy tend to think about such things!) and then the fact that so many women have become clergy in recent years, and women tend to live longer than men, all contribute to this. I might add to this list the fact that living a meaningful life is generally good for our health.

All this means that none of the clergy are going to become rich on their pensions. I am probably thinking about this at the moment because in a few months my clergy pension is going to become a substantial portion of my annual income, but I have been thinking about another issue of late that has a certain connection to this and that is the question of assisted dying.

Let me explain what I mean. You can never quite anticipate what will form the legislative programme of the next government but from all indications there is a good chance that a bill concerning assisted dying will be presented whichever party is elected. This issue is not a party-political issue. Within all the major parties there are differing opinions on the matter and so if a bill is presented there is likely to be a free vote on the matter. It may be a bill similar to that presented a few years ago by Lord Falconer who served as Lord Chancellor in Tony Blair's government. He proposed that someone who is terminally ill and mentally competent should be allowed to die in an assisted manner as long as two doctors sign the form. Such a system already exists in the American state of Oregon and now in Canada and the Netherlands.

I mention Canada because when its legislation was first proposed one piece of information that was presented for consideration was how much money would be saved from the state's social care budget if a proportion of its citizens were to opt for assisted dying and not for long term nursing care and, as you can imagine, that is quite a lot of money. It would be true here as well. We all know that care for the elderly, especially at the end of life, is one of the biggest drains upon our public purse. To put the matter brutally if more of us were to choose to end our lives rather than to receive nursing care we would be saving the state a considerable sum of money and everyone would be better off. Those that are still alive anyway. In such a calculation assisted suicide almost seems like an act of self-sacrifice. If I do not prolong my life my children and grandchildren will be better off.

This brings me back to where I began with my reflection upon the Church of England Pension Fund. If clergy did not live so long the fund would have much more money to pay out to the living members of the scheme. I would be better off when I retire later this year if the older members of the scheme were to die a little sooner.

Now I hope that you are all suitably horrified that I should think in such terms even for a moment. How could I want those good and wise men and women to end their lives simply so that I can earn a little more money? Surely, I should be thinking in terms of all that I receive from them in terms of spiritual riches? And you would be right. The way in which we grow old and then the way in which we die is one of the greatest gifts that we can give to those who come after us. Such a gift is almost impossible to quantify. And one of the most important parts of that gift lies in the way that the rest of us bear the burden of caring for those that we love and that includes the financial burden that we may bare. As a result of the care that we have for those who are dying we are all enriched in ways that are impossible to measure. I have seen this again and again as a priest and I have experienced it myself in the life of my own family. So, I hope to be a burden to those who love me. Not in some sadistic fashion but in calling upon them to give of themselves beyond their strength and their resources and to find that the more they give the more they will receive. I say that I 'hope' to do this because I do not know in advance whether I will have the courage. I simply hope that I will. My hope is that in some way my last words will echo the words that Jesus said on the cross as he breathed his last. "Father into your hands I commend my spirit".

PRAYERS FOR THE KING

One of the problems in writing for a March magazine at the beginning of February is that I do not know how things will stand when the magazine is distributed in a few weeks time. I write this on the day after Buckingham Palace announced that the King is being treated for cancer and as I do so I know that you, as well as I, all wish His Majesty a full and speedy recovery, and I ask you to remember him in your prayers. Ever since the restoration of the monarchy in 1660 the Church of England has always made it our task to pray for our monarch and for England. The two belong together. I pray for the King, as I did for the late Queen, each time I lead a service in church and in my daily prayers. I remember reading a lovely piece in The Church Times a few years ago which ended by encouraging its readers to pray for the Queen because, it said, "You can be sure that she prays for you".

God Save the King.

From the Archive: May 1991 Memories of Hadley by Mollie Butler

I arrived in Hadley at the beginning of 1939 from the city lights of Edinburgh. How surprised I was to find there was no running water. The nearest shop was a mile away and no footpath to walk on. There were some buses into town from the village, but not very often. However, my disappointment did not last long as war broke out that year changing everybody's lifestyle.

The next year, 1940, I married a local man and went to live in a cottage down Pope's Hole. The cottage was one of nine. Seven of them shared the same pump for water, and six used the same wash house and copper. We all did the washing in turns and this seemed to work. My father-in-law lived in the hamlet and he was a crack shot with a gun. Very soon I learned to feather and dress wild birds, pigeons, partridge and pheasant, and also skin rabbits. We all had good gardens in those days with beautiful fruit trees and black and red currant bushes. With all the produce from the garden plus the game, I felt I was attending banquets. Food rationing wasn't a problem. This city girl settled down to country life.

Three bakers' vans delivered every week – De Greys, France and the Co-op. Two grocers (Evertons and Pesters) also came around from the village carrying all sorts of goodies and caused much excitement. There were two hardware vans which called once a fortnight with paraffin, soap, buckets, pots, pans and hardware of every description. One (King & Hazelwood) came from Droitwich, the other was Mr Hunt from Worcester. Both drivers were characters and could tell a good tale. The milk lady used to bring our newspapers and anything going from the butcher; she was wonderful and always laughing about something.

Further up the lane nearer the Droitwich Road there is a red brick cottage which had been extended, and a dear old lady lived there with her son and daughter. This was Mrs Fowler who celebrated her 100th birthday. This was most exciting. We all collected to buy a present and all our names were on a scroll and framed. I shall never forget that event as I had not encountered anyone of that age before. One hundred – how marvellous!

When the war ended, we had bonfires and parties, and sports for the children. It was all very gay. 1946 was the highlight as Lord Doverdale of Westwood House had electricity brought so we in Hadley were able to have it too; this was wonderful. The first thing I bought was an electric boiler. No more lighting the copper to wash or to bath. Oh, to have the tin bath in front of the fire and to be able to turn on the tap and just let the water run in was sheer luxury. My first electric bill for the quarter was £2.

The trail takes in a small section of the Monarch's Way, a 625 mile-long footpath that traces the escape route allegedly taken by King Charles II in 1651 after being defeated in the Battle of Worcester. Our 5.5 mile circular route is pretty flat with just a few well-maintained wooden stiles to cross.

After the walk, which will finish about 12.30pm, drinks and biscuits will be provided in the Jubilee room at the Hall. We are inviting everyone to make a small donation of ± 1.50 per head towards the cost of refreshments. The surplus will be given to the Hall as a contribution towards overheads.

Children are welcome. Dogs are welcome too, but under close control and on a short lead. Everyone is responsible for their own safety. There is no need to register for the walk. We hope to see you on the day.
