Rector's Thoughts

Reverend Stephen Winter Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



My journey from Droitwich to the parishes of the benefice frequently takes me past the Big Bear roundabout at the beginning of the Hampton Lovett industrial estates on the way to Cutnall Green. The first exit from that roundabout takes you off to the big commercial dairy there and often, as I approach it, a big Muller Dairy truck is coming from my left. What follows is that daintily choreographed dance that you will all be familiar with at any major roundabout. If I still have a little way to go to the island the lorry will carefully pull out onto it and even if I get onto it before he exits it I pause a moment to let him go. And if I arrive there first he will wait for me to go past him before pulling out behind me.

It was only the other day that it struck me what a wonderful thing this is. His truck is so much bigger than my little Ford Fiesta and if he wanted to he could force his way onto the roundabout first and I would have no choice, but to wait for him. I know that it is a requirement that we should give way to the traffic coming from our right at a roundabout but would I really go through the rigmarole of making a complaint if he were to force his way past me?

People that I have known who have lived and worked in other parts of the world have told me that you can't take this courtesy for granted in other places. People who have come from India are amazed that people stop for a red light in the middle of the night here when roads are quiet and friends I know who once worked in Alexandria in Egypt tell me that blue flashing lights on an ambulance are routinely ignored there and people do not give way to them. Why bother to help a complete stranger?

The distinguished historian, Tom Holland, has recently been arguing that this kind of courteous behaviour is normal, even taken for granted here, because of the way that Christian values have completely shaped our culture. In an interview that you can find on YouTube with the former deputy prime minister of Australia, John Anderson, Holland argues that the high point of this arc of world history came at the end of the Second World War in 1945. The defeat of the overtly anti-Christian Nazi regime in Germany came with a realisation of what you get when Christian norms are rejected. Holland argues that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights that was agreed by the international community after the war is actually a Christian document through and through. Any of you who have ever been to my house will see a framed copy of it hanging over our dining table. If you read it you will see how Christian it is. Even the USSR had to sign it back in 1948 although they had no intention of keeping it because for a brief moment the whole world agreed that all humanity shared these rights in common. Christians declare that this is so because we are all created in the image of God.

Discerning readers will observe that sadly human rights have been honoured more often in their breach than in their observance and that the opening statement of the declaration that "ALL human beings are born free and equal" has always been more of an aspiration than an achievement, but the very fact that in 1948 the entire General Assembly of the United Nations signed this including the newly independent countries

of India and Pakistan as well as the Warsaw Pact countries dominated by the Soviet Union was a testament to the global triumph of Christian faith and values.

But Anderson and Holland sadly do not end here. They note that increasingly countries from around the world are calling these values "western" and not "universal". Rising powers in Asia argue that we in the West have no right to impose these values upon them. They claim that when we speak of human rights we are acting as imperialists. And all too often we in the West argue that human rights are not universal, but are only for our own kind. It is as if we say that when God created us he only created some of us in his image. How can this possibly be?

As you receive your April edition of your magazine the Church will be beginning the season of Easter that this year begins on Sunday 31st March and ends at Pentecost fifty days later on Sunday 19th May. Easter is a glorious celebration of the triumph of light over darkness, of love over hatred, and of life over death and Christians declare these triumphs confidently because we believe that Jesus is risen from the dead. Because of this faith we confidently declare the values that have underpinned our society for many years but if we lose confidence in the faith, will we lose confidence in the values as well?

Sushella Burford, the "Finds" Liason Officer from the Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) will talk about recent finds in Worcestershire.

The PAS is run as a service by the British Museum and Museum of Wales. Most finds are from metal detectorists, who are usually allowed to keep the find once it has been identified and recorded. Finds recorded by the scheme help advance knowledge of the history and archaeology of England and Wales. The Worcestershire and Warwickshire team recorded 2727 items in 2023, ranging in date from early stone age to mediaeval. The talk will show some highlights from the last 12 months.



The Origins of The National Health Service



The 5th July 1948 saw the birth of a great institution, the National Health Service (NHS). It was a product of the post-war Labour Government under Clement Attlee and launched by the then Minister of Health, Aneurin Bevan. The aspiration of the NHS was to bring reliable, accessible and free health-care to all. However, its inception was not without problems and disagreement.

Prior to the NHS, health-care was fragmentary and available usually only to those who could pay for it. Religious institutions from the Middle Ages offered medical care of the most basic kind, supposedly to all, for a "charitable" donation. The workhouses offered a home of sorts to the poorest in society.

In the Nineteenth Century, "Friendly Societies" offered a form of insurance to working men. They paid out a sum for inability to work from illness or injury and some access to medical care. About 8% of the population were covered by them. These societies employed their own doctors, known as "Club Practice". There were stringent restrictions on the care the doctors could give and it was not popular, neither with doctors nor members, but was better than nothing. "The Citadel" written by A.J. Cronin painted a very unflattering picture of medical practice under the "Club" system. From this book came the stories of Dr Finlay's Casebook and the battles between Dr Finlay and Dr Snoddie.

Lloyd George's Liberal Government at the start of the 20th Century introduced some "Welfare Reforms"; school medical inspections, old age pensions (introduced in 1908) and unemployment insurance. These came about because politicians had fears for "The Future of the Race" and the fear of a so-called "Imperial Decline" following the Boer War.

1911 saw the introduction of "National Health Insurance" which saw a system part paid by employers, part by employees and part by the state. The Act gave wage replacement for illness and under the "Panel" system, patients joined a General Practitioner's list. The insurance only applied to working men and the medical benefits were limited. Non-wage-earning women, children and the economically inactive elderly were excluded. All hospital treatment was excluded apart from treatment for tuberculosis. Many people opposed the compulsory insurance act as they felt they had better benefits with the Friendly Societies, many of whom went out of business when the Act was introduced.

At this time the hospital system was also under great strain. Voluntary hospitals ran on a charitable basis, which during the inter-war years came under severe pressure. There were about 1000 of these around the country, from small provincial hospitals to the large London teaching hospitals. Local Government had, in 1929, taken over the Poor Law Hospitals when that system ended. Generally speaking, these hospitals were no better than long term care institutions offering basic care.

Finally, before 1948 and the start of the NHS, one of the largest providers of medical care was run by Local Government, under a local Public Health Director – The Medical Officer of Health (MoH). Although by the 1930s this had become a huge organisation, the main role was improvement of Public Health, such as providing vaccinations and checking the quality of milk.

To sum up: the pre-war system was patchy with uneven access and under severe financial strain. There was a general recognition from Government and medical professional institutions that "something must be done."

The onset of war saw some changes, with a rapid reorganisation of services under the "Emergency Medical Services" to deal with the threat of bombing. In 1942, the Beveridge Report on "Social Insurance" created the idea of a "common risk".

A 1944 White paper proposed a National Service based under local authorities and a Central Medical Board controlling hospitals and "health centres".

It was the medical profession who were the most vocal opponents. The BMA (the British Medical Association, which acted as the Doctors Union) objected to a salaried service and local authority control of health services. This was based on two objections: the threat to clinical freedom and control of medical services lying in the hands of lay people.

The Labour victory of 1945 and the appointment of Aneurin Bevan as Health Minister brought a change of attitude shown in the 1946 NHS Act, which laid the foundations for the nationalization of hospitals controlled by appointed local bodies and primary care run by general practitioners. Hospital "Consultants" would be salaried. However, almost up to the start of the NHS on July 5th 1948, there was disagreement on terms for a salary for community or general practice. In the end no agreement could be reached and GPs (General Practitioners) kept their self-employed status, being able to continue in private practice, but being paid an annual fee for each NHS patient they agreed to "keep on their books". This continues to this day whereby GPs run their own "Practices" and employ the staff, paid by the NHS for the services they provide and hospital consultants are employees of the NHS.

CARING FOR CREATION

With Spring just around the corner and the welcoming prospect of sunny days, dormant plants and bulbs emerging from the warming soil and hibernating animals awakening, I was interested in a recent Songs of Praise programme called Caring for Creation.

The Bible tells us that the incredible beauty of earth is all God's work and that we are responsible for looking after it. However, as climate change becomes an increasingly urgent issue, what should Christians be doing and how can they make a difference?

Presenter, Claire McCollum, went on a quest to discover Christians who were doing just that: making a difference.

The Midlands is home to one of the largest textile processing plants in the country and is run by The Salvation Army. There, Claire met a devout campaigner who encouraged Christians to turn to God to help the environment. The state- of- the art technology in

the plant identified the textile by fibre type and protected tons of waste from going to landfill. This ultra-efficient recycling to provide cheaper clothes is not that far removed from the vision of William Booth, founder of The Salvation Army over 150 years ago. His vision was to bring the word of God to the streets of London's East End; however, he soon realized that empty stomachs and bare feet were not conducive to promoting his cause. He, therefore, set about feeding the hungry, providing shelter for the homeless and clothing the poor. This culture of social ethos remains at the core of The Salvation Army today.

One Christian, a Clinical Trial Research Scientist, felt called by God to protect our native wild life. She found that spending time with nature was an important way of connecting with God. She thought of ways of engaging her church community in climate change with a Christian perspective and this prompted a series of Bible Study classes. Many verses in the Bible encourage us to reflect on the beauties which God has created and reveal the use of the natural world by God himself in his teachings. She felt so inspired to encourage households to adopt greener habits that her church received funding to scale-up this concept to nationwide level and endorsed by the Church of England, the Creation Care Scheme went on-line in 2020. It is now being used by 2000 homes in the UK to encourage and help families to adopt greener habits and go beyond recycling to care for God's creation.

Getting outside is also a great reminder of the rich diversity of nature we have in the UK and how much each element plays a vital part in the eco-system. It is so important to protect even the smallest of God's creatures as without one, we potentially lose the other. Pinetree Farm near Northampton is an animal in-need sanctuary where domestic and wild animals are rescued from danger and cared for. The charity currently homes over 600 creatures with the Winter months being particularly busy with hedgehog rescues. The staff chose the hymn "All things bright and beautiful" to show their commitment and passion in restoring the animals to a safe and friendly environment.

No doubt, many of us do feel close to God in nature and creation and if we enjoy this experience then we are encouraged to protect it. The following reflection seems to sum up everything so well:-

"Dear Lord, Guide us all to better care for your beautiful world."

And what better way to end than with the beautiful words of the hymn "The Day Thou Gavest" by the Reverend John Ellerton.

MOTHERING SUNDAY

St. Mary's Mothering Sunday service was held this year on March 10th. Mothering Sunday always falls on the 4th Sunday of Lent and provides a wonderful opportunity to both give thanks and to celebrate the love of mothers everywhere.

Mothering Sunday began purely as a religious event in the 16th Century. The word "Mothering" referred to the Mother Church i.e. the main church or cathedral of the region. It was considered important for people to return to their home or Mother Church. Consequently, each year in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their Mother Church. Inevitably, this became an occasion for family reunions and it became a tradition for children, mainly daughters who had gone away to work as domestic servants, to be given a day off to visit their mother and family. As the girls walked along the country lanes, they would pick wild flowers to take to church or give to their mother as a small gift.

Richard Jeynes took the service and delightfully involved the young children during his sermon. Many thanks to Laureen Moyse for leading us through the hymns and to our readers, Rachel Nicholson and Ann Chapman.

After the blessing of the flowers, the beautiful posies were distributed amongst the congregation. The bunches of Spring flowers always make a lovely splash of colour in the austerity of Lent and made a particularly welcome contrast to the day's grey, rainy weather.

Coffee and delicious biscuits were served by the Friends after the service. Thank you so much to those who came along to join us and to help celebrate such a special day.
