## **Rector's Thoughts**

Reverend Stephen Winter Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



For six years of my life I was a priest visiting people in their work place. I seem to have done six or seven year jobs throughout my working life. I will have to think about that some time. You are probably fortunate to be getting rid of me at the end of August!

Anyway, back to the work place. During those years I offered myself to people as a listening ear. God does an awful lot of listening. Whether we are consciously praying or not God listens to all the stuff that is in our hearts all the time and God loves us. Actually, God loves us so much that he cannot get enough of us. I love the words that the 14th century mystic, Julian of Norwich, heard Jesus say to her. "If I could have suffered more for you I would have done so".

I visited two kinds of workplace. One kind was factories, mainly in Redditch, and the other kind was the government's scientific research establishment, before it was privatised, in Malvern. You might think that these were very different but the one thing that they shared in common was that people needed to feel that they mattered and were valued.

One of the most influential voices about the nature of organisations in recent years has been Charles Handy. Born the son of a Church of Ireland rector in County Kildare, Handy was an executive for Shell, taught at the London Business School, ran a centre created by Prince Philip and Robin Woods (some of you will remember him as Bishop of Worcester) based at Windsor Castle and then worked freelance. In talking about his life, he said that one of the most important moments within it was attending his father's funeral. He says that he did not have a particularly high opinion of his father, feeling that he had wasted his life on a couple of small parishes in the Irish countryside until he saw a full church and people lining the street to pay their respect to his father and then heard from many people about how his father had touched their lives.

Each of the people that he spoke to told a story of how they felt they mattered to his father and about how they mattered in the world. This taught him one lesson. The other was about the nature of a village. He saw how people felt that there was a place in which people felt they belonged and that they mattered. He also saw the part that a parish priest played in this world through his father's example. I will write more about this another time.

Handy came to feel that organisations needed to become more like a village. Please note, more like a village than like a suburb. A village is strong when there is a sense that everyone matters and that everyone has a part to play. Nobody owns the whole village but everyone has a stake in its prosperity. A village event like a fête or the recent celebrations of the Queen's Jubilee or the King's Coronation brought people together. Both turning up to organise the event or turning up to enjoy it matter. In that sense everyone has a part to play. The renowned anthropologist, Robin Dunbar, (I used to visit his parents when I was a priest in Birmingham and took both of their funerals) argues that we function best in a community of about 150 people. They are the people who recognise us in the street and if one of them is missing from an important occasion we really notice it.

I heard a lovely story a few years ago about an island in the Orkneys on which no child had been born for a number of years. The people there felt that the island was dying. Then a little child called Lucy was born after 32 years and the wonderful Orkney poet, George Mackay Brown wrote a Lullaby for Lucy, and it was set to music by Peter Maxwell Davies, a composer resident on the Orkneys and Master of the Queen's Music. It is a lovely song and you should find it on your favourite streaming channel.

The point that I am making is that in a village everyone and everything matters. A wedding, the birth of a child, a baptism, a sad farewell at a funeral, helping at a village event, turning up. I could go on. And the more you give, the more you receive. A friendly greeting with a smile on your face is so important. Asking your neighbour how they are.

I have received so much from the villages that I have served as a parish priest and I would like to extend the village from more than just the houses that are clustered together to form a particular settlement. I think it is the parish that really matters. Parishes were first created in England in the 7th century by Archbishop Theodore. He came from Tarsus in Turkey which was in the Eastern Roman Empire at that time. Who would have thought that a foreigner would have given us something that feels so English? Something that has lasted for 1400 years.

This is a point that Charles Handy makes. The village and the parish have lasted for a long time. They have learned, on many occasions, how to adapt to changing times.

So, make your contribution to your village and your parish. It may be in helping to organise something. That would be great. But even if it is just doing something for a neighbour or just staying on friendly terms with them that really matters.

And thank you for buying this copy of your parish magazine. This matters as well.

## St Andrew's Tenor Bell Update

The Faculty Application to gain permission for the removal of the Tenor bell, it's recasting, and subsequent refitting is proceeding well. Once that is granted the work can commence, which we envisage to be at the beginning of May.

Significant preparation is required, to include the moving of bell ropes, dismantling the clock assembly and opening the hatches, all of which will enable to bell to be lowered to the ground in the West Porch. The advice from Whites of Appleton Church Bellhangers is that once removed, not less than 6 weeks will elapse until the bell is back in place. Throughout that time, and probably for a couple of weeks either side, there will be no Church bells rung on Sundays, for weddings, or Thursday evening practice sessions. The clock will also of course remain silent until the bell is replaced.

Rest assured, normal service will be resumed as soon as possible!

This essential work comes with a price tag (approx. £25,000) as indicated in my article published in the February magazine. The first fundraising event is an organ extravaganza by the acclaimed concert organist – Keith Hearnshaw, to be held at St Andrew's on  $11^{th}$  May. Further details available in Church and elsewhere in this Magazine. One of the things we might all think about is how easy it is, with a bit of organisation, to get the taxman to pay up to 40% of any contribution we make – this is all built into the tax system, and it is a waste not to take advantage of his generosity!

## Ombersley Gardening Club



After the wet weeks our gardens are gearing up for a great summer and there's so many jobs we can be getting on with like sowing seeds, preparing the lawns, weeding and generally tidying up and doing day to day jobs.

Looking around our beautiful local countryside we see many of the fields are a mass of sunshine yellow as the rape seed comes into bloom cheering up the dullest day. As we all try and become greener a few tips for you to try. If you like avocadoes rather than throwing away the skin use it as an eco-friendly compostable seedling pot. The scooped-out skins provide enough room to fill with compost and to plant your seeds also allowing enough room for the roots to grow. The stones can also be used to grow into a plant or softened and ground down as a nutritional food for tomatoes, strawberries and other potassium-loving plants, otherwise the stone and the skin can be disposed of in your compost.

Old towels are something else that can be useful in the garden. Use as a weed barrier, just covering with soil and mulch. They are also very good as a frost protector as they act as an insulator. Folded-up they can be used as a kneeler and they are also excellent for watering plants by cutting into strips, popping one end into a vessel of water weighed down with a stone and the other end in the soil of the plant. Always, position the water above the plant if possible.

Our next meeting is on the 16<sup>th</sup> May and entitled Potty Time, A Year in Pots with Harriet Rycroft followed on the 13<sup>th</sup> June, with a self-drive visit to The Walled Garden at Westwood House. We look forward to welcoming you at our next meeting and until then, Happy Gardening.


## The Smile of Spring



## **Benjamin Brecknell Turner**

## England's First Rural Photographer and his Connection with Worcestershire

Fox Talbot is well known as the inventor in the 1830s of an early type of photography, rivalling Daguerre's inventions in France. One of his friends was the son of a London manufacturer of candles and tallow: Benjamin Brecknell Turner (BBT). When BBT inherited the family firm, which was known to produce the finest candles in London, he achieved the financial security which allowed him, from 1849, to participate in the new expensive hobby of photography.



The Great Exhibition at Crystal Palace in 1851 brought photography to the general public and to an elite in society who could afford the one guinea licence payable to Fox Talbot for his calotype process, and then the considerable expense of the camera and developing equipment.

Unlike most photographers of the period, who concentrated on portraits or scenic views of historic buildings, BBT photographed rural scenes and villages especially around the Midland Counties. His photographs of Ombersley are the earliest known, dating from 1852 to 1854. In 1854, he published a collection of his photographs, many of Worcestershire scenes, entitled "Photographic views from nature". These can be found online or by searching the Victoria and Albert Museum archive catalogue.

So, what is the Worcestershire connection? Agnes Chamberlain was the daughter of Henry Chamberlain, who managed the London branch of the Chamberlain Worcester China business, in New Bond Street. Henry left the business in 1836 and bought Bredicot Court, a 16<sup>th</sup> century farmhouse with 400 acres to take up "gentleman farming". Bredicot is about 4 miles East of Worcester and BBT and Henry used it as a country retreat for their hobby of photography. As for Agnes; well, on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1847, she and BBT were married in the church at Bredicot.

#### **Photographic Process**


Benjamin Brecknell Turner used 'Calotype" or "Talbotype" (paper negative) photography, licensed from Fox Talbot. The negatives were made from fine paper, prepared by brushing with a solution of silver nitrate, drying it, then brushing with a solution of potassium iodide. After exposure, the negative was then waxed to make it translucent. A positive image was made by placing another piece of sensitised paper beneath the negative and leaving it to print in the sun. The prints were the same size as the negative.

Sushella Burford, the "Finds" Liasion Officer from the Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) will talk about recent finds in Worcestershire.

The PAS is run as a service by the British Museum and Museum of Wales. Most finds are from metal detectorists, who are usually allowed to keep the find once it has been identified and recorded. Finds recorded by the scheme help advance knowledge of the history and archaeology of England and Wales. The Worcestershire and Warwickshire team recorded 2727 items in 2023, ranging in date from early stone age to mediaeval. The talk will show some highlights from the last 12 months.
