Letter from the Rector

Reverend Canon Tim Williams Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



Dear Friends,

In recent months, many of us will have noticed a troubling tendency in our wider society. Voices of extremism, fuelled by anger and fear, seem ever more determined to stir up division. We see the growing polarisation of people "-us" and "them" – and the rise of nationalism that too often slips into hostility, rather than a healthy love of one's country.

Patriotism, rightly understood, is about gratitude for the blessings of our land, its people, its traditions, and its freedoms. In essence, a patriot is proud of their country for what it does, while a nationalist is proud of their country no matter what it does. That subtle difference matters greatly: one encourages responsibility and humility, the other can excuse harm and injustice. History warns us where such thinking can lead.

As Christians – as people of the Kingdom of God – we are called to a higher allegiance. Our baptism marks us not only as citizens of this nation, but as citizens of Christ's Kingdom, which has no borders and embraces all peoples. Racism, homophobia, and xenophobia have no place in that Kingdom, because they deny the image of God in our brothers and sisters. Jesus welcomed those on the margins, healed those who were excluded, and broke down walls of hostility. He taught us to love our neighbour – and he made it clear that our neighbour includes the stranger, the foreigner, even those we might be inclined to fear.

In such times, our calling is not to retreat into silence, nor to mirror the anger around us, but to be salt and light. We should show, by word and deed, that the Kingdom is built on reconciliation, mercy, and peace. Where society hardens into suspicion, let us sow kindness. Where others stir hatred, let us pray for courage to speak truth in love. Where division grows, let us build bridges of understanding.

The world may try to separate and divide us, but as Kingdom people we know a deeper truth: "In Christ, there is neither Jew nor Gentile... but all are one." Let us hold fast to that vision, and let our lives bear witness to it.

St Francis of Assisi – A Saint for Our Times

The creation season ends on 4th October. The day the Church celebrates the feast of St Francis of Assisi, one of the most beloved and recognisable saints. Known for his love of nature, his humility, and his deep devotion to Christ, Francis continues to inspire Christians and non-Christians alike, even eight centuries after his death.

Francis was born in 1181 in the Italian town of Assisi. The son of a wealthy cloth merchant, he grew up enjoying comfort and privilege. But after a period of illness and spiritual searching, Francis underwent a radical conversion. He gave up his inheritance, chose a life of poverty, and began to live simply, preaching the Gospel in word and deed. His life of joy and radical trust in God attracted many followers, and the Franciscan order was born.

Francis is perhaps most famous for his closeness to creation. He called the sun his "brother" and the moon his "sister" recognising all creatures as part of God's family. He lived in harmony with nature, not out of sentimentality, but because he saw in it the reflection of the Creator's love.

So, what does this 13th-century saint have to say to us in 21st-century Britain?

- Care for Creation In a world struggling with climate change and environmental destruction, Francis reminds us of our Christian duty to cherish the earth as God's gift. Pope Francis 'encyclical Laudato Si 'takes its title from Francis's famous "Canticle of the Sun," calling us to live more sustainably and responsibly.
- Simplicity and Contentment Francis shows us that happiness is not found in wealth or possessions but in relationships: with God, with one another, and with the world around us. His example invites us to question our own lifestyles and ask: what really matters?
- Peacemaking At a time of conflict, Francis crossed battle lines to meet the Sultan during the Crusades, choosing dialogue over violence. His courage in seeking peace speaks powerfully in a world still torn apart by war and division.
- Joyful Faith Above all, Francis lived with joy. Even in poverty, illness, and hardship, he radiated a deep love of God that drew others in. His life reminds us that Christian faith is not about grim duty but about freedom, joy, and love.

We may not all be called to leave everything behind as Francis did, but we can follow his spirit in small ways: taking time to notice God's presence in the beauty of creation, living more simply, choosing peace in our relationships, and nurturing joy in our faith. As we celebrate his feast this October, let's ask ourselves: what might it look like to be a little more Franciscan in our parish, our homes, and our daily lives? "Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words if necessary." — a saying often attributed to St Francis, reminding us that our lives are our most powerful witness.

St Mary's Church, Bishop's Wood

Some of you may have noticed a rather sad looking lychgate partially hidden by foliage, just a little North of the Mitre Oak Inn on the A449. If you park on the little slip road in front of the lychgate and pass through it, you will come to a small church hidden away. Rendered and half-timbered to give a mock Tudor appearance, it was built in 1882 as a mission church in the most southerly part of Hartlebury Parish by Bishop Henry Philpott. Workers in this part of the parish found it too far to travel to Hartlebury Church and this chapel was built as a chapel-of-ease.



The lychgate was built in 1892 as a memorial to Bishop Philpott and has commemorative mosaic inscription by the famous firm of Salviati of Venice. Their work adorns St Mark's in Venice and in London; the Royal Albert Hall, Westminster Abbey, St Paul's and the Albert Memorial. amongst other important buildings. As far as I am aware, this is their only work in Worcestershire.



Despite being restored in 1987, the church has fallen into disrepair and one cannot gain entrance as health and safety has deemed it too dangerous to enter. It seems that there are either no funds to restore this lovely building or no use for it. However, the graveyard is an oasis of calm and peace, a haven for wildlife and a respite from the bustle of the A449. A few minutes sitting on one of the benches there is time well spent.

A trip from Droitwich to Witley Court in 1878. How much has changed - apart from the purple prose?

WYCHBOLD CHOIR EXCURSION

On Tuesday, the 3rd instant, the Wychbold Choir made their annual excursion to Witley Court and the Abberley Hills. The company set out at 9 a.m. in two large conveyances with every promise of a fair and pleasant day before them. Their route lay along the picturesque road from Droitwich through Ombersley. A pleasanter drive could not have been selected, and perhaps no other county in England can furnish more rural beauty than such as is to be found along this country road. The up-hill and down-hill course of the journey – catching one moment precious glimpses of woodland and parkland, mansion and lake – next moment sweeping along a valley way over-arched with tall forest trees and hemmed in with sweetly-scented foliage. The busy world for the while was left behind, and the heaven-made country was all their own for enjoyment.

For miles the road lay along the boundary of Westwood Park, the seat of Lord Hampton, and this part of the drive alone was well worth the journey, for it is charming. Ombersley – with its Gothic church and one straight street of old-fashioned English houses of tall gables and varied colouring – was passed, and lane after lane traversed, overhanging with bright golden apples until the first halt was made at Holt Fleet Inn, where the Severn sweeps onward in a broad deep stream, and spanned by a suspension bridge. After a short stay here the party proceeded on, still through beautiful scenery, until the park gates of Lord Dudley's seat were reached. The grounds were entered, and to all, as the beauties of the places were gradually unfolded, it seemed like the entrance to fairyland – waterfalls, rippling streams, islands, savannahs, over which roamed flocks of deer and cattle, groupings of splendid trees and shrubs. Wherever the eye turned it found a new point of vantage, each moment succeeded by some more exquisite object, until the artist himself would despair as to which was the best point of view for his picture.

The Hall was reached, majestic and commanding, forming three sides of a square, the side wanting being that on the entrance from the main drive. The party gained admission to the gardens, and were simply enchanted with the sight presented. To describe it adequately would be impossible in our short notice. All the art of the poet and the painter have been drawn upon and reflected here in their sweetest and loveliest forms and colouring. Fountains with figures emblematical of mythical story —

one of Flora, and another telling the legend, as many suppose, of St. George and the Dragon, but really of Perseus on the winged horse; Perseus rescuing Andromeda, chained to a rock, who has been placed there by a cruel and selfish father to be drowned by a sea monster, which appears rising from the sea, represented by the basin of the fountain. This piece of sculpture is reckoned to be one of the finest in England. When the fountain, which covers a wide area, is in full play, it must be a sight worth seeing; and one of the members of the choir seemed to think that the happiest condition in life would be to be seated in the verandah above the high range of steps leading to the terraced lawns, with cigars and a bottle of champagne, and the full contemplation of the beauties before him; and no wonder, for the sight was one for a fairyland story, not for every-day life. Beds of flowers in imitation of carpeting, hearth rugs, pin cushions, &c., the tropic groups here and there, the richly-ornamented gates, the distant streams and its murmuring rills and cascades, the timid deer starting here and there, and the lazy cattle lying on the ground, embedded in clover flowers. The entire scene, when viewed from the hill to the right of the hall, was a scene of enchantment, which made the men, in no envious spirit, say, What money can do! But money without art would be only dross.

The old oaks were spanned, of course, and one of them measured over fourteen yards in circumference; nine grown-up persons touching hands being only just able to embrace the exterior. This tree, of course, must have been here many hundred years, perhaps even before the advent of the Saviour himself, or the conquest of Julius Caesar. Unfortunately, the visitors were unable to see the interior of the church, which it appears is a *parish church*, the housekeeper at the hall refusing the keys, because the party had no order of permission to see it! We offer no comment, to state the fact will supply criticism for itself.

After a hearty dinner at the Hundred House at 3.0, and a stroll in the neighbourhood of the hills, the party returned to Holt, where about an hour and a-half was spent in boating, visiting the hills and gardens of the neighbourhood, in walking along the river side to see the weir or waterfall, collecting ferns, &c. The visitors started for home at seven o'clock. On reaching Droitwich, the party stopped in front of St. Andrew's church and sung in harmony the anthem "Lord of all power and might," and alighting at Wychbold three hearty cheers were given for Baron Amphlett, Mr. Corbett, M.P., Mr Popplewell, and others, who had so liberally provided the treat, which everyone thoroughly enjoyed.

And we can now see the fountain in all its glory, thanks to English Heritage.



Vehicle Activated Sign update

During August, data were downloaded from the latest vehicle activated sign (VAS) located on the Ombersley side of the River Severn Bridge at Holt Fleet. There are now 5 units located around the village; data from the other four will be reported early in 2026.

The VAS was purchased by Ombersley and Doverdale Parish Council following concerns by local residents over the speed and volume of traffic. The latest VAS was installed in July 2024 and the data were taken over a time period of 410 days. The data recorded are for traffic incoming towards Ombersley.

The speed limit is set at 40mph and you will note that c. 89% of traffic is within the speed limit. However, when you consider that the volume of traffic is nearly 2.2 million, 11% (220,000) vehicles are breaking the 40mph speed limit.

All information has already been shared with our district councillor, county councillor and local enforcement agencies. Unfortunately, the VAS unit does not identify the type of vehicle, but there is a general perception of an increased volume of articulated lorries and heavy vehicles using the Holt Fleet river crossing and our county councillor has been asked to liaise with highways to investigate other route options.

On a positive note, there has been increased speed-recording activity around the village and the mobile speed unit has been present on several occasions outside Ombersley School. Finally, the school 20mph signage is fully operational and work by highways to clear foliage obscuring signage is due to be actioned in the coming week.

Number of vehicles incoming towards Ombersley = 2,172,869.

The average speed incoming was 34.45mph with the main spread being between c.32mph and 40mph. The maximum speed incoming was in the range 45mph to 60mph.
