Letter from the Rector

Reverend Canon Tim Williams Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



Dear Friends,

November – A Time to Remember

November is a month of remembrance. The changing of the seasons, the falling of the leaves, and the quiet of shorter days seem to lend themselves to reflection and thanksgiving.

At the start of the month, we celebrate All Saints' Day when we remember with gratitude all those men and women who have faithfully served God on earth, but do not have a feast day of their own. They are the countless, often unnamed, people whose lives have shone with the light of Christ — people who have sought justice, shown mercy, and walked humbly with their God (Micah 6:8).

The following day, All Souls' Day we pause to remember all who have died — our loved ones, friends, and all those who have gone before us into the nearer presence of God. We give thanks for their lives and pray that they may rest in peace and rise in glory.

As the month continues, we come to Remembrance Sunday, when we recall with deep gratitude those who gave their lives in the service of others — in two world wars and in conflicts since. We remember the courage, sacrifice, and selflessness of so many, and we pray for all who still suffer as a result of war and violence.

As I write this, our nation is still reeling from the vile and horrific attack on the synagogue in Manchester, made even more shocking because it took place on Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year for the Jewish people. Such acts of hatred grieve the heart of God. They remind us of the evil that arises when prejudice and division are allowed to grow unchecked.

We must never forget that people of all creeds, colours and backgrounds fought side by side to defeat the evil of the Nazi regime. The best way we can honour those who gave their lives for freedom is to commit ourselves to the work of peace — to speak up against antisemitism, homophobia, xenophobia, racism and hatred in all its forms.

As St Paul reminds us in Romans 12:21, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." May that be our prayer and our purpose this November — that,

remembering the saints, the faithful departed, and the fallen, we may also renew our commitment to live as people of light, peace, and hope in God's world.

Why Do We Ask the Saints to Pray for Us?

In the Apostles' Creed, we affirm our belief in "the communion of saints" — the deep and enduring fellowship that unites all God's people: those on earth, those who have died and are with Christ, and all who will come after us. This means that the Church is not just made up of those we see around us, but also includes all who have lived and served God faithfully through the ages.

When we ask the saints to pray for us, we are not worshipping them — worship belongs to God alone. Rather, we are asking for their prayers, just as we might ask a friend or fellow Christian to pray for us. We believe that the saints, being alive in Christ, continue to care for us and to pray for the world. As Jesus said, "He is not God of the dead, but of the living" (Luke 20:38).

It's a way of recognising that love and prayer do not end with death. The saints, who now see God face to face, are part of the same family of faith — and their prayers join with ours before God's throne.

In the Book of Revelation, St John describes the saints in heaven offering the prayers of the faithful on earth to God as "golden bowls full of incense" (Revelation 5:8). This is a powerful image of how our prayers are united with theirs in the presence of God.

So, when we ask the saints to pray for us, we are doing something deeply relational and hopeful: We acknowledge that we belong to one great family of faith; We take comfort in knowing that we are not alone in our struggles; And we affirm our belief in the victory of life over death, through Jesus Christ.

In short — we ask the saints to pray for us because they are still our brothers and sisters in Christ, still part of God's living Church, and their prayers, like ours, rise before the God who loves us all.

POSADA

You may have heard or seen this word in the run up to Christmas and wondered what it's all about! The word **posada** means inn or lodging, and traditionally, in Mexico, posadas are a celebration of the Christmas story. The celebration takes place on nine nights from December 16th to 24th and commemorates Mary and Joseph's search for a place to stay where Jesus could be born. Posadas in Mexico feature hot food and drinks, sweets, music, and piñatas.

The Church of England encourages a version of this as a chance to spend an evening with the Nativity characters, storybooks, a candle and more during Advent, the weeks leading up to Christmas. In Ombersley this has now become a tradition. Schools and local families sign up to host Mary & Joseph — small, knitted characters.

The characters, storybooks, candle and more will be blessed at the <u>Advent Carol service on 30th November (Advent Sunday) at 4pm</u> and will be received back into church on Christmas morning at the Family Service, when Mary and Joseph can be joined by the Baby Jesus.

If you are a family with young(ish) children/grandchildren, this is a great opportunity to 'take some time out' in the busy run up to Christmas. If you are adults, this is a chance to pause and reflect – there are some cards to facilitate this.



Ombersley Gardening Club



Autumn, with its ever-changing colours is such a beautiful time of the year. The leaves begin to fall carpeting lawns, paths, roadways and the countryside, a sure sign that winter is on its way.

Tulip bulbs now need to be planted ready for a wonderful display in the Spring, along with roses and fruit trees. Dahlia tubers, gladioli and canna lilies will need to be lifted and stored away. Protect plants against the cold and frost if you haven't already done so and lift pots off the ground to prevent them becoming water logged. Prune raspberry bushes to the ground for a good harvest next year along with gooseberry, blackcurrant and redcurrant bushes.

Clear away all finished summer plants and cut down faded perennials. Clear leaves and debris from the lawn, giving it maybe its last mow of the year - aerate and feed it along with trimming the borders to prepare it for the winter months ahead. Tidy leaves and fallen debris from ponds making sure something is in place to stop the pond completely freezing over.

At the club's last meeting, a wonderful evening was spent with Nick Bailey from Gardener's World and we now look forward to welcoming our last speaker of the year, Carl Sadler who will be entertaining us with his talk 'Miserable Old Trugger' on the **20th November.** This will be followed by the last event of 2025; the Gardening Club's Christmas dinner, which will be held on the **11**th **December** and is always a great evening.

With the colder weather arriving, be sure to help out our wonderful wildlife which may struggle to find food and water. Keep birdfeeders, hedgehog food and water vessels and containers topped up, clearing away ice when necessary.

Now is the time to collect holly and store it safely away for Christmas wreaths and garlands before the birds eat all the berries.

We hope to welcome you at the last talk of the year in November and look forward to seeing you then.

Wonderful Invention

The Biro or ball point pen: A Hungarian- Argentinian Laslo Biro was fed up with the blotting and smudging which came with the use of fountain pens. He was inspired by the use of quick drying inks used in newspaper printing presses. In 1938, he patented his design of a small roller ball bearing which distributed the ink onto paper. The first biros were produced in 1944 under the name "Eterpen". The pen's reliability and practicality especially at higher altitudes led to its use by the RAF during World War II.

More Wonderful Inventions

The Paperclip: The first bent wire clip was patented in 1867 by Samuel Fay, but wasn't the shape we know today and was used to attach paper to fabric. The modern "Gem" paperclip is attributed to William Middlebrook of the Gem Manufacturing Company in the USA, who patented a machine to produce the clip in 1899. The original designer of this shape clip is not known, but a Norwegian, Johan Vaaler, patented a dissimilar design in 1899 and Norway now claims him and Norway as the birthplace of the modern paperclip.

Sellotape: Richard Drew invented the first transparent adhesive cellophane tape in 1930, whilst working at 3M. He also invented masking tape a few years earlier. It came about as there was a need in the burgeoning car manufacturing business, for efficient masking of areas when painting motorcars.

Rector's Letter: Air Raid Precautions (A.R.P.)

The equipment kept at this port has now been returned to Droitwich, and I am very glad to be quit of it all, especially the gruesome winding sheet which gave me the shivers every time I looked at it lying on one of my study tables. From 1940 onwards, being so conveniently situated in the very centre of the village, the Rectory has been increasingly been used as a dump, and the accumulation of impediments scattered around several rooms, has defied all attempts at dusting. The eight evacuees, who at intervals stayed here, gave far less trouble, at least they kept themselves and their rooms tidy. But there is tidying up a 'junk shop' and I marvel that my household did not revolt long ago.

All that is over now and there is peace. One can move without getting mixed up in pump piping, or tripped up by buckets and sandbags. One can also breath freely an atmosphere untainted by the odours of anti-gas clothing and ointment, gas masks and dubbin, used bandages, iodine and all the nostrums of 1^{st} Aid – smells which the strongest tobacco failed to decontaminate.

Nevertheless, strange to say, I regret that the post is closing down, for I shall miss the excitement of it all, to say nothing of the real pleasure it gave me to welcome the wardens as often as the siren sounded, and one by one (with a wager on the first), they reported for duty. They did not always relish being knocked up at one or two a.m., still less so when the 'all clear' coincided with their arrival at my front door. But, by and large, I think that like myself, they have enjoyed the thrill of A.R.P. and bear me no grudge for having called 'em out so often or put on so many 'exercises'. As a part reward for past services, the authorities will, for a consideration, hand back some of the equipment as follows:

- S. Pumps 7/6. Useful for spraying fruit trees, motor cars or the neighbour's cat.
- Rattles 2/6. Fine for scaring birds.

The early days of "The Wireless"

You may remember listening to the wireless as a child: perhaps hearing Mrs Dale tell off her GP husband Jim (1948), or being shocked when Grace Archer died trying to save her horse "Midnight" (1955). You may have "listened in" on a crystal radio receiver, which worked without any external power source - a wonder to me when my father and I made one in 1966. The story of the start of wireless broadcasting goes back long before that.

Creating radio waves by spark induction developed during the last 10 years of the 19th century, culminating in Marconi's inaugural transmission across the Atlantic, from Cornwall to Newfoundland on the 12th December 1901. It wasn't until Christmas Eve 1906 that an American, Reginald Fessenden, made the first audio broadcast. Ships at sea heard him playing 'O Holy Night' and reading a passage from the Bible.

It was this ability to broadcast to ships that encouraged the British Navy to develop radio, as prior to that, ships relied on line-of-sight communication, by flag or lights. During the First World War, the British Government requisitioned private wireless equipment from the few pioneers developing it, regarding further development as a national secret.

After the war, America had developed radio technology without restriction and with the discharge from British Forces of troops used to using radio, the British Government realised that the "cat was out of the bag". The first public wireless broadcast in England took place on June 5th 1920, in Chelmsford when the Marconi Company broadcast Dame Nellie Melba singing, the performance sponsored by "The Daily Mail". This was heard as far away as Europe. Their broadcasting station "2MT" was initially for 30 minutes once a week. Soon a sister company started in London – the famous "2LO" station.

Initially the GPO (General Post Office) was concerned about unregulated broadcasting, but in 1922 took matters in hand by setting up the "British Broadcasting *Company*" and broadcasting as "2LO" introducing the famous "London Calling" by-line. The first Director-General (note the military allusion) was Lord Reith whose founding principles were famously "to inform, educate and entertain". The Radio Times appeared first on the 28th September 1923 as the BBC's official guide to broadcasts.

At this time, most people "listened in" using crystal wireless receivers with headphones. Valves, which could amplify radio waves and audible sounds were being developed before and during the First World War, but remained expensive and complicated to use. However, as the 1920s progressed they became cheaper and more technically advanced. Battery driven valve sets attached to "horn" loudspeakers started to be more common. Families could listen together!

Valve technology continued to improve. Additionally, by 1930, many homes were being connected to the new National Grid and mains powered radios using high quality "moving coil" internal speakers appeared. Built into decorative polished wooden

cabinets, they were no longer a scientific toy, but now part of elegant living room furniture.

The Government of the day realised that, for the first time, they could speak to the entire nation simultaneously and instantaneously. This was used to the full in the Second World War when broadcasts presenting favourable news were made to the nation. The Nazis responded with defeatist broadcasts by "Lord Haw Haw"; William Joyce an American Nazi sympathiser living in Germany. A cunning plan by the Germans, foiled by the English who treated his broadcasts as a comedy show. During the war, replacement radios and spare repair parts became scarce. The Government, recognising the power of broadcasting, directed manufacturers to produce standard "Utility Radios" at a price of £12 3s 4d – about £630 in today's money.

The large, cumbersome and not easily portable wireless of the first 50 years of the 20th century met a sudden demise in 1957 when the Sony company produced the tiny TR-63, the first non-valve radio using transistors. At the same time as "The Tranny" became available, young people became "Teenagers" and a new type of music, called "Pop" hit the airwaves. The world was never to be the same again, and one wonders what Lord Reith, with his high founding principles, would have made of "Ru Paul's Drag Race" (if you haven't seen this programme, DON'T look it up!).

The stimulus to write this article follows a recent OHG visit to Robert Thornton's early wireless collection and his fascinating talk about the history and social impact of wireless broadcasting. I owe him due recognition and thanks. *David Collier*
