Letter from the Rector

Dear Friends,

As we approach the final weeks of the year, our journey through Advent invites us to slow down and pay attention. Yet this can feel like a tall order when life speeds up around us — school events, shopping lists, travel plans and all the demands December brings. Even so, Advent gently draws us back to what really matters: to watchfulness, to hope, and to the quiet expectation that God is drawing near.

In our churches, the Advent candles mark this steady movement towards Christmas. With each new flame, the growing light reminds us that even the smallest spark can push back the darkness. It is a message our world needs. Many around us face uncertainty, anxiety, or loneliness at this time of year. Yet into such places, Christ comes — not with fanfare but with compassion, not with force but with vulnerability.

At Christmas we celebrate that extraordinary moment when God entered human life as a child. The stable at Bethlehem was far from perfect — draughty, cluttered, and hardly silent — yet it became the setting for God's greatest gift. There is deep comfort in that truth. It tells us that Christ is not deterred by our imperfections; He meets us where we are, in the midst of ordinary days and complicated lives, offering peace, hope, and the reassurance that we are loved.

Some say the Christmas story is just that — a story. But when I visited the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, I was convinced that this was a holy place where something remarkable truly happened. I left with my face glowing; I had encountered something profoundly sacred. And those who know me will know that I'm not prone to flights of fancy.

As we move into January and celebrate Epiphany, our attention shifts to the wise men who travelled far in search of the Christ child. Their journey was long, uncertain, and probably uncomfortable, yet they followed faithfully the light they had been given. In a world often searching for meaning, their story encourages us to keep seeking God's presence — in prayer, in Scripture, in one another, and in the everyday blessings we might easily overlook.

The gifts of the Magi also speak powerfully to us as a new year begins. Gold for a king, frankincense for worship, and myrrh foreshadowing his suffering and death: together they remind us that Jesus is the one who reigns with justice, who draws us into the presence of God, and who shares the full depth of human life. As we step into 2026, what gifts might we offer Him? Perhaps renewed time for prayer, small acts of kindness, a willingness to forgive, or the courage to pursue what is good and true.

January often encourages us to take stock — to look back with gratitude and forward with hope. None of us knows what lies ahead, but we can trust the One who walks with us through every season. The God who came to us in Bethlehem continues to guide, strengthen, and surprise us with grace. As I look back, Mary and I are deeply grateful for the warm welcome we have received — and for the harvest meals! As I look forward, I'm excited to discover what God has in store for us.

Mary and I wish you and your families a very happy and holy Christmas. May you and your loved ones know the deep peace of Christ this Christmas, the guiding light of His

presence through Epiphany, and the renewing hope of His love throughout the New Year.

Christingle Service

On *Sunday the 11th January at 10am,* one of the loveliest events we hold in St Andrew's Church is taking place. It's the annual traditional Christingle service. During this very informal, child-friendly service you can construct your own Christingle, using an orange, a candle, small sweets and fruits and a red ribbon to wrap around the orange. All the candles are then lit, one by one, as we stand in the main aisle of the church. A moment for reflection on Jesus, the light of the world.

The service is linked with The Children's Society, a charity that supports young people who, for reasons beyond their control, are in great difficulty in their lives.

During the service there will be a collection in aid of this very worthwhile charity.

Please come and join in, bring your children and grandchildren, everyone's welcome.

By the way, If you already have a special Children's Society Collection Box you've been collecting money in for the past year, it's a good opportunity for you to bring it with you so that your donations can be sent off to The Children's Society).

Yew tree in St Andrew's churchyard

The large yew tree in front of the church has been a concern for many years, particularly the effect it has on the fabric of the building. The branches have, at times, reached to within about a metre of the main window. The close proximity has created a micro-climate that adversely affects both the window and the surrounding stonework. It is likely that the roots are also close and there is a risk to the 200-year-old foundations, which are far less substantial than modern requirements. Now that this window has been restored at great expense, we need to take steps to prevent further damage.

Last March, the PCC was granted permission by Wychavon to fell the tree. We have since obtained quotations and have accepted one from the owner of a local sawmill who will make use of the main trunk. Because of this, his quote was much lower than the other three we received. A Faculty has been applied for from the Diocese; once granted, the tree will be felled.

As someone had previously written, this is a rather sad case of the wrong type of tree planted in the wrong place. The PCC intend to plant a suitable replacement tree in a more appropriate place within the churchyard.

Ombersley Gardening Club



2025 nears its end, Halloween and Bonfire Night have now gone and the colder weather and darker nights are creeping in. As we wake to morning frosts and mists and the chance of snow there are still plenty of jobs to be done in the garden to keep you busy in December and January. Heading towards the shortest day of the year with limited daylight hours, we need to grab the chance of good weather and spend some time in the garden pruning fruit trees and acers if necessary.

Move pots and planters to shaded areas and cluster them together to help protect the roots from frost. Make sure plants and shrubs are prepared for the frosts and cold weather. Spread fresh gravel or grit around alpine and rockery plants and continue to mow the lawn if still growing. Harvest any holly you may need for garlands and wreaths and stand it in a bucket of water until needed. As spiders come in from the cold, place conkers on window sills and shelves to keep them at bay.

Please don't forget to look after our wildlife as the weather becomes colder and food becomes scarce, especially for our feathered friends. Place uncooked oats, raw peanuts, walnuts, soaked dog kibble and baked potatoes outside; these are just some other foods besides bird seed that can mean birds survive the winter.

Looking back over the past year the Gardening Club has welcomed some amazing speakers, not least Nick Bailey from Gardener's World whose talk in October was a huge success.

December is the month when the club celebrates the end of the year by holding their Christmas dinner to start off the festive season. This will be taking place on the **11**th **December**, so members book your places!

On **January 15**th we welcome our first speaker of the New Year when Pip Smith will give a talk entitled 'Garden Design - Is there room for a Mercedes, pool and pony'. February brings our AGM along with a meal.

As the year comes to its end all that is left now for your Gardening Club committee to do is to wish everyone a Wonderful and Merry Christmas and a very Happy and Healthy New Year. We look forward to seeing you all next year.

The origin of some of our best loved carols



Carol singing may have started in Roman times when Christian-themed songs began to compete with pagan songs celebrating the winter solstice. The earliest known carol is "The Angels Hymn" which dates from 129 AD. Over the centuries as Christianity took hold, Christmas carols changed from a solemn celebration of the Nativity to more joyful and secular themes. By the Medieval Ages, carols such as "God rest ye merry gentlemen", the "Coventry Carol" and "While shepherds watched their flocks by night" had appeared, reflecting this change.

In 1880, the first Christmas Carol Service was held in Truro by Edward White who later became Archbishop of Canterbury. It was in 1928 that the Choir of King's College, Cambridge first broadcast their carol service over the wireless (that's a radio for anyone under the age of 65!).

So, I thought it would be interesting to look at the origins of some of our best loved carols:

O Holy Night: In 1847, Placide Cappeau, a wine-seller from Southern France, was asked by the local priest to write a festive poem to celebrate the renovation of the church organ, which had been seriously damaged by flooding. Cappeau felt it should be accompanied by music, so asked his friend Adolphe Adams to write a tune.

Silent Night: Originally written in German, "Stille Nacht" was composed in 1818 by Franz Gruber with lyrics by Joseph Mohr. It was translated into English in 1859. In 2011 it was declared an "intangible cultural heritage" by UNESCO. During the famous Christmas truce of 1914, it was sung from the trenches across no-man's land by both English and German forces.

In the Bleak Mid-winter: Based on a poem by Christina Rossetti, this carol was written sometime before 1872 in response to a magazine request for a Christmas poem. The poem became recognised as a carol after it appeared in the English Hymnal in 1906, with music by Gustav Holst.

Hark the Herald Angels Sing: The lyrics for this carol were written by Charles Wesley, one of the principal leaders of the Methodist movement. Mendelssohn wrote the music. Wesley was born in 1707, the eighteenth son of his parents. Over his lifetime

he wrote over 6,500 hymns some of which are still mainstays of the English Hymnal, such as "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" and "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling".

O Come All Ye Faithful: No-one knows exactly who wrote the lyrics, but candidates include King John IV of Portugal and John Wade, who published the first printed version in 1751, whilst Handel and Gluck have been suggested as the composers. However, it is most probable that it has been sung by Cistercian monks since the 12th century.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel: Originally written in Latin, this carol was translated into English in 1851 by John Mason Neale for "Hymns Ancient and Modern" when it was first combined with its famous music. The hymn has its origins over 1200 years ago in monastic life. This hymn is usually sung in the 7 days before Christmas Eve.

Coventry Carol: "Bye-Bye Lul-ly, Lul-la, Thou Little Tiny Child." The oldest known text was written down by Robert Croo in 1534 and comes from the Coventry Mystery Plays, originally performed by the city guilds. The lyrics refer to the "Massacre of the Innocents" by King Herod, taken from Chapter Two in the Gospel of Matthew, when Herod ordered the slaughter of all infants in Bethlehem under the age of two. Supposedly it was sung as a lullaby by the mothers of the doomed children.

O Little Town of Bethlehem: Following a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, Rector Phillips Brooks wrote the text to the hymn after he was inspired by the views of Bethlehem from the hills of Palestine. Three years later in 1871 his church organist Lewis Redner wrote the melody for the local Sunday school children's choir.

Once in Royal David's City: Written in 1848 by Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander, wife of the Anglican Primate of Ireland. She is also remembered for her hymn "All Things Bright and Beautiful".

The Holly and The Ivy: The association of holly and ivy predates Christianity and as the only greenery available in winter would have been used in pagan midwinter festivals. The carol has varied in words and tune since mediaeval times, but the version we know today was collected in 1909 by the English folk song collector, Cecil Sharp, from a woman called Mary Clayton in Chipping Campden.

Of course, the most famous Carol of all, was written by a certain "Noddy" Holder in 1973, a song which went straight into the No.1 position in the charts for Slade. Merry Christmas Everyone!

Ombersley Pie

Contribution from the late Lord and Lady Sandys, Ombersley Court, to the Recipe Book (Ombersley Pie) compiled by Sue Hughes and Maureen Callow in 2009 to raise money for the Memorial Hall.

This is definitely a dish for a special occasion and assumes that the combined ingredients of *oysters* and *beef* would be appreciated and well-liked by guests. It has been a great favourite for luncheons at shooting parties at Ombersley Court in an earlier generation i.e. in Edwardian days, a century ago.

Ingredients (serves 6)

2 dozen sauce oysters; 2 lbs good quality beefsteak

1 egg yolk; tablespoon flour; ¾ pint (425 ml) beef stock

1 tsp each of salt and pepper; ½ cupful of chopped parsley; Sufficient puff pastry or shortcrust pastry to cover the pie dish

Method

1. Cut the beefsteak into thin slices approx. 3 inches (8 cm) square.

- 2. Beard the oysters, then blanch the beards in the oyster liquor, which must be reheated, seasoned, strained and added to the gravy in the pie just before serving.
- 3. Place an oyster on each slice of beef and roll up lightly.
- 4. Mix the flour, salt and pepper together on a plate.
- 5. Dip the rolls of meat in the mixture, then place in the pie dish.
- 6. Sprinkle the rest of the seasoning mixture, together with the chopped parsley between the layers of meat.
- 7. Pour in enough beef stock to three-quarters fill the pie dish.
- 8. Make the pastry and roll out to a suitable thickness.
- 9. Lay a border round the edge of the pie dish, and having wetted it, cover the pie with the same pastry. Moisten and press the edges well together.
- 10. Make a hole in the centre of the top and brush the surface with the egg yolk.
- 11. Bake the pie in a hot oven (200°C, 400°F or gas mark 6) until the pastry has risen and set.
- 12. After this, the pie should be cooked more slowly for up to 2 hours in total.
- 13. Before serving, pour the oyster liquor, which has been prepared earlier, through the hole in the top of the pie.

This is all part of an ancestral interest in unusual and tasty flavours among cooked dishes. Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce owes its origin to spices of India and Bengal, introduced to the tables of the world in the 19th Century via my ancestor, Lt General, The Lord Sandys.

The Weighbridge History

This late 19th or early 20th Century black and white hut is featured in many publications and is a familiar landmark to so many people travelling through Ombersley.

The Weighbridge Hut used to house the official and measuring equipment for the operation of a public weighbridge.

Originally the hut sat on what is now the pavement outside Cresswells, the house opposite with the weighing platform in the roadway. It was run by Mr Rea who lived at Cresswells and who ran a small garage and petrol pump from his back garden.

The hut and weighbridge were moved to its present, less hazardous position, when the road junction was altered and the roundabout installed in 1935. The corner by which it now stands was the former site of 'The Old Cross' public house, which was demolished. The weighbridge was finally closed in 1977 having run at a loss for some time. The weighing mechanism was removed and the pit in front of the hut filled in during 1979.

One of only two surviving weighbridge offices in the county of Worcestershire, the hut has been placed on the Historic Environment Record and is an iconic feature of Ombersley village. The County Council own the hut and part of the site, with the Parish Council owning the rest.

The trough in front of the hut was donated by Lord Sandys and the benches on the site were gifts. One came from the Ombersley Women's Institute and the other from the British Legion to commemorate the golden jubilee of the local branch. The 'plague stone' trough is also situated on the site.

The Parish Council and Ombersley Conservation Trust have recently provided funds to refurbish the building and converted it once again into a working office to be used by the community of Ombersley.
