Letter from the Rector

Reverend Canon Tim Williams

*Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's,
Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)*



Dear Friends,

Can I begin by thanking you, on behalf of Mary and I, for your kind gifts and Christmas wishes as we celebrated our first Christmas here in the Benefice.

Here we are, barely over Christmas when we find ourselves headlong into Lent. The decorations have not long been packed away, the last carols still echoing in our minds, and yet on Ash Wednesday, 18th February, we are marked with ashes and invited into a very different season of the Church year.

Lent has its roots in the earliest centuries of the Christian Church. The forty days reflect Jesus' forty days in the wilderness, a time of prayer, fasting, and preparation before the beginning of his public ministry. From the beginning, Lent was a season of learning, repentance, and renewal - especially for those preparing for baptism at Easter, and for the whole community supporting them.

The ashes we receive on Ash Wednesday are a powerful reminder of our humanity "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." They are not meant to weigh us down, but to ground us – to remind us of who we are and who we depend on.

In today's world, Lent can feel awkward or inconvenient. Life moves fast, and we are surrounded by noise, busyness, and constant demands on our attention. Giving something up, taking time to pray, or choosing simplicity can feel almost counter-cultural. And yet, perhaps that is precisely why Lent still matters.

Lent invites us to pause and to notice. It asks us to look honestly at our lives: what draws us closer to God, and what pulls us away. The traditional disciplines of prayer, fasting, and generosity are not about punishment or deprivation, but about making space — space for God, for others, and for a deeper awareness of what truly matters.

Though we may feel we have arrived at Lent very quickly this year, it comes as a gift rather than an interruption. It is an opportunity to step back from the rush, to walk thoughtfully toward Easter, and to allow God to shape and renew us along the way.

As we begin this Lenten journey together, may it be a season not just of sacrifice, but of grace, honesty, and quiet hope.

St Valentine, St Valentine's, and Saints of Love

Just before Lent this year as with every year on 14 February, hearts, flowers, and declarations of love take centre stage. Yet behind the modern celebrations of St Valentine's Day lies a story that is far older, quieter, and more complex than the commercial holiday suggests.

The figure of St Valentine himself is wrapped in legend, and his story sits alongside other, lesser-known saints of love - among them St Dwynwen, the Welsh patron saint of lovers.

Who Was St Valentine?

The name "St Valentine" refers not to one single, clearly documented individual, but likely to several early Christian martyrs named Valentinus. The most famous legend places St Valentine in 3rd-century Rome during the reign of Emperor Claudius II.

According to tradition, Claudius believed unmarried men made better soldiers and outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, a Christian priest, is said to have defied this decree by secretly marrying couples in Christian ceremonies. When discovered, he was imprisoned and later executed around 14 February, sometime around AD 269.

Another version of the story says Valentine befriended - or healed - the blind daughter of his jailer, and before his execution sent her a note signed "from your Valentine." Whether historically accurate or not, this detail has endured, shaping the language of love ever since.

By the Middle Ages, Valentine had become firmly associated with romance. The poet Geoffrey Chaucer helped cement this link, writing in the 14th century that birds chose their mates on St Valentine's Day. From there, the connection between the saint and romantic love flourished.

St Valentine's Day gradually evolved from a religious feast into a cultural celebration of love. In medieval Europe, lovers exchanged handwritten notes and small tokens. By the 18th and 19th centuries, printed Valentine cards became popular, especially in England.

Today, the day has taken on a global, commercial character - but at its heart remains the idea of love freely given, even in defiance of hardship, which echoes the legend of St Valentine himself.

I wondered if there was any recipe associated with Valentine.

While there is no single recipe directly associated to him, medieval Europe associated love with sweetness, spice, and warming foods. Honey, in particular, symbolised affection and abundance – hence the term “honeymoon”. Simple honey cakes would have been familiar fare during the period when Valentine's legends were taking shape. Also, during the Middle Ages, Europeans, believing that apples had aphrodisiac qualities, used the fruit in love rituals. If a woman wanted a man to love her, she would sleep with an apple under her arm and persuade the man to eat it the next day. The belief was that he would fall in love with her after consuming the apple. Mmmmm!

This is not a medieval recipe but my niece's award-winning recipe for honey cake.

- 250g honey plus about 2tbsp extra to glaze
- 225g butter
- 3 large eggs beaten
- 300g SR flour

- Heat oven to 140° (fan), line 20cm tin.
- Melt butter, sugar and honey slowly in a pan over low heat. Once liquid increase heat and boil for about 1 min. Leave to cool for 15-20 mins.
- Beat eggs into cooled honey mix. Sift flour into large bowl and pour in egg and honey mix, beat until the mixture is smooth.
- Pour into tin and bake for 50-60 mins. Turn out cake once cooked, warm 2 tbsp honey and brush over top to glaze and leave to cool

St Dwynwen: Wales Patron Saint of Love

Long before Valentine cards crossed the Atlantic, Wales had its own saint of lovers: St Dwynwen. St Dwynwen lived in the 5th century and was a Welsh princess, one of the daughters of King Brychan Brycheiniog. According to legend, she fell in love with a young man named Maelon, but their relationship was forbidden. Heartbroken,

Dwynwen prayed for relief from her feelings. An angel is said to have appeared, granting her three wishes: that Maelon be released from his suffering, that true lovers be blessed, and that she herself never marry.

Dwynwen devoted her life to God and settled on Llanddwyn Island (Ynys Llanddwyn) off the coast of Anglesey, where a sacred well was believed to predict the fortunes of lovers. She is remembered not for romantic fulfilment, but for compassion, selflessness, and care for the happiness of others.

St Dwynwen's Day is celebrated on 25 January, and in recent years it has enjoyed a revival in Wales as a gentler, more local counterpart to Valentine's Day. There are no recipes associated with St Dwynwen, but Welsh cakes are good. There are any number of recipes on-line.

Whether through the defiant courage of St Valentine or the quiet devotion of St Dwynwen, these stories remind us that love has many forms - romantic, sacrificial, hopeful, and kind. Beyond the cards and chocolates, the saints of love offer a deeper reflection: that love is something worth protecting, nurturing, and sometimes even surrendering for the good of others. And perhaps that is a tradition still worth keeping.



Worcestershire Bombs

During the Second World War, the Luftwaffe dropped a total of seven bombs on Worcestershire. Most were dropped as aircraft returned from trying to bomb Birmingham and the Austin works at Longbridge. If they were unable to identify the target, they dropped their load randomly on the return to Germany. It seems that the Luftwaffe navigated to and from the industrial Midlands by using the River Severn as a way marker.



However, there was one deliberate raid on Worcester, during lunchtime on Thursday 3rd October 1940. A single Dornier 17 bomber targeted the MECO (Mining and Engineering Company) works on the Bromyard Road. At a height of 300 feet, four bombs were dropped and the plane then machine gunned the area around the factory, including a children's playground. Seven people were killed and fifty-six injured. The factory, which was making winding gear for barrage balloons shut down for five days.

The raid took place at the end of the Battle of Britain when German High Command issued the order that "nuisance raids on London and important industrial targets should be made in all weathers, by single bombers or fighter-bombers, in order to give the enemy no rest".



Of the seven people killed, one was Thomas Santler who, with his brother, is credited with making, in 1887, the first motor car in Gt. Britain. In their Malvern works, they produced a coal fired steam car, which still exists today.



Remembrance Sunday – your thoughts are welcome

Remembrance Sunday mornings in Ombersley have become a special time for many residents with crowds congregating on the main road opposite the War Memorial waiting to pay their respects to the men and women who died for us in two World Wars. The procession of Guides, Brownies and wreath layers that assemble at the Crown & Sandys currently march down the main road to meet the waiting crowds.

In the past, ex-service men and women would have been proud to be part of this walk accompanied by a full marching band. This way of paying our respects has served us well over the years, but as the years pass by, there are very few ex-service personnel, there is no live band, and we are very grateful that the young lady who plays the bugle is still able to be part of the service. Maybe it's now time to consider whether this tradition should continue in its present form.

We are very fortunate that St Andrew's Church is right in the heart of the village set in its own beautiful grounds, and which could be used to begin a new tradition of a very moving and respectful service.

The idea being considered is that residents would enter St Andrew's churchyard through the gate at the end of Church Lane past Ombersley Garage, passing graves of the young men killed, which would each be marked by a poppy or statue.

Members of the procession would collect their poppies inside the west door of the church. The procession would then proceed down the long path towards the War Memorial to music being played from the church. The service would take place by the War Memorial. Wreaths and poppies would be placed on the War Memorial from the churchyard side.

It is proposed that the cost of closing the road (approximately £10,000 over five years) would instead be spent making access to the War Memorial from the churchyard as safe as possible.

We head into 2026 with a calendar full of interesting speakers and events. Quarter Days and Cross Quarter Days

It was not that long ago that the cycle of our lives was regulated by the Church and religious festivals. Nowadays we are so used to paying (or receiving!) rent monthly and being able to buy fruit and vegetables from the supermarket whenever we want, that we forget that food used to be seasonal and rent was paid just four times a year. The regular punctuation of the year, based on the Church's calendar, was divided into "quarter days".

These quarter days were when rent was due, servants were hired and school terms started. They also ensured that debts were paid and unresolved lawsuits didn't linger on. Accounts had to be settled and a reckoning made and publicly recorded.

Roughly three months apart and near to the two solstices and equinoxes, they were: Lady Day, 25th March or the Feast of Annunciation; Midsummer Day, 24th June or the Feast of Nativity of St John the Baptist; Michaelmas Day, 29th September or The Feast of St Michael and All Angels; Christmas Day, 25th December or the Feast of the Nativity of Jesus.

Up until 1752, Lady Day, the 25th March, was the first day of the New Year in England when it was harmonised with Scotland, making the year change start on January 1st. A further complication arises because of the change in 1750 from the "Julian" calendar to the "Gregorian" calendar. This advanced the calendar by 11 days in order to make up for an inaccuracy in the Julian Calendar which did not reflect the actual time it took for the Earth to circle the sun. The end of the British tax year is still based on the quarter days, ending on April 5th which is 11 days later than the old Lady Day in the Julian Calendar. At some more traditional schools and universities, the autumn term would start on 29th September and is still known as the Michaelmas Term.

The Cross Quarter days are four holidays falling between the Quarter Days: Candlemass (2nd February), May Day (1st May), Lammas (1st August) and All Hallows (1st November). In the Celtic tradition, these dates mark the beginning of spring, summer, harvest season and Halloween.

So far, so simple, but who can tell me when St Swithin's Day is and the significance of it? Here's a clue! Whatever the weather is on the 15th July will set the weather for the next 40 days.

Case of Over-crowding at Ombersley

Samuel Hancocks, of Sytchampton, labourer, was summoned for allowing his dwelling-house to be over-crowded. Mr Parking, the Inspector, said the defendant had two sleeping rooms in his house which, according to the Government rules, were capable of accommodating four adults and one child only but which in reality were occupied by ten persons – three men, three women and four children.

The Bench made an order for the abatement of the over-crowding in fourteen days, by the removal therefrom of defendant's son, wife and children, and a lodger.

BEGGING

Benjamin Hollis, a miserable looking dirty old man who said he was a labourer but admitted that he had done no work for two years, and had no fixed abode, was fined 10s and costs or 14 days for begging at Ombersley. Sergt. Hanley said he had been looking for defendant for some time, having received complaints of him sleeping on hayricks and in farm buildings. He had been abusing people when they refused him.

AND THE EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Ombersley police manage to get hold of some funny specimens of humanity in their endeavours to compel His Majesty's subjects to obey the law.

A unique example was brought before Mr. P. S. Williams at the County Magistrates' Office on Thursday on the usual charge of begging.

He was shockingly dirty, and not by any means sweet smelling. He claimed friendship with the Magistrate and his clerk, addressing them as his "dear friends". He was alleged to be a labourer, but admitted that he had done no work for two years. Perhaps this was why Mr Williams sent him to prison for fourteen days. At any rate it will do him good "if it is only to get a wash," as one spectator remarked, "and it would not do to send him for less as he might catch cold if he were turned out too soon after such an unusual operation".

Toilet Paper

Joseph Gayetty, an American, is widely credited with the invention of modern commercially available toilet paper. First introduced in 1857 and available even until the 1920's, Gayetty's Medicated Paper, complete with a watermark, was sold in packages of flat sheets. It contained aloe as a lubricant and was originally sold as an anti-haemorrhoid medical product.

The Modern Toilet

Although water closets had been around for a while, Thomas Crapper, whose name has been overly associated with toilets, did invent the floating ballcock and improved the S bend in 1880 by inventing the U bend. He received several Royal Warrants and manhole covers in Westminster bearing his name have become a minor London tourist attraction.

MORNING PRAYER SERVICE

St. Mary’s first service of 2026 was Morning Prayer on Sunday 4th January. A bitterly cold day to venture out, but it was well worth it to enjoy the lights and decorations in church for one last time before the traditional 12th day when Christmas is “tidied away” for another year.

January and the celebration of Epiphany mark the arrival of the Magi in Bethlehem after their long journey in search of the Baby Jesus. They brought gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh as we all know.

Licensed Lay Reader, Richard Jeynes, who took our service, surprised us all by bringing a little bag of frankincense and a charcoal kit. After lighting the charcoal and letting it

get very hot, he invited us to sprinkle a little frankincense on top and watch as it burnt to emit a perfumed fragrance. Frankincense is an aromatic resin from the *Boswellia* tree and is used in incense and perfume and is a symbol of deity. Gold is a symbol of kingship and myrrh (an embalming oil), a symbol of death. Scholars thought that these three gifts were chosen for their special spiritual symbolism: Jesus' Kingship, his Priestly role and his Death.

Thank you, Richard, for a very interesting service and for reminding us of the story of The Three Kings which we all sing about every Christmas in the lovely carol " We Three Kings of Orient Are".
